As I write this newsletter article, the 4th of July is just about a week away. The whole concept of independence comes to all of our minds. After all, it's called Independence Day for a reason. The concept of independence is something we're all familiar with. It's something we seek from early on in life.

Children are a great example of that. From very early on little children seek to expand their independence. They want to try and solve that puzzle. They want to build the wall out of blocks. They want to ride their bikes without training wheels. They want to pick out their clothes in the morning. They want to have a say in what color their bedroom is painted. They want to walk to school by themselves. They want to be able to decide who they hang out with and what time they should be home. They want to have a car so that they have the independence that comes being able to go where they want, when they want. They want a job so they can afford to buy the things they want. They want to go away from home to college so that they can be independent of mom and dad and "spread their wings."

Now I have to admit that none of this is inherently wrong or problematic. It's perfectly normal and in fact healthy for children to want to become independent from mom and dad so that they can function as productive adults when they do move out on their own. In that sense independence is a good thing. In fact, the Independence Day we celebrate each year is also a good thing. Our nation had its beginning after a hard fought war so that we could gain our independence from British rule. We certainly enjoy that freedom today and none of us would have it any other way.

What troubles me about independence is when people (and nations) seek to have greater and greater independence from God. I fear we are quickly becoming a nation no longer "under God" as we say in our Pledge of Allegiance (if in fact, we are allowed to say that at all!) We are abandoning so many bedrock principles of our Biblical faith. The long held Biblical understanding of marriage is under attack today unlike at any other time in our

nation's history. It's in the process of being totally re-written under the guise of "marriage equality" and, in fact, gay marriage is now legal in every state.

Our nation has long ago abandoned the Biblical principles protecting the sanctity of human life. And as a result some 60 + million babies have been "terminated" under the guise of choice. The concept of a Biblical God has been removed from almost all public places of our nation so as not to offend anyone. What would our founding fathers have to say about all of this? Of the 250 or so people whom we regard as "founding fathers" the vast majority by their own admission were Christian. They confessed Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. They believed He died on the cross for their sins and the sins of all people. And they prayed and endured much persecution so that their dream of an independent nation "under God" would be a reality for years to come. They gave us a lasting heritage that we enjoy today.

Yet it seems independence from God and His will has not brought about many positive changes for the people of our country. To be sure, there are many people running around who say that all of these changes have been good for our country. It's about time, they say. It's only fair, they say. What right do we have to tell people what they can or cannot do, they ask? Independence from God allows us that freedom. It allows us to decide what's good, right, and salutary for our lives. And it always, always leads us down paths that lead <u>away</u> from God.

In spite of the independence that many in the world seek today, we Christians know we need to become even more dependent on Him. We need His help and guidance now, more than ever. Now is not the time to throw up our hands in defeat and say there's nothing we can do. Instead we need to do what our founding fathers would have done.

First of all, we need to pray. We need to get on our knees and ask God to help in this time of need. We can't seek independence from God and yet try and fix things on our own. Only by His power and

presence can things change. If we want to leave a godly heritage for our children and grandchildren, prayer has to be the place we start.

We need to seek with greater fervor a dependence on God and His will for our lives. Worship needs to become primary for all of us. Keeping our faith in Jesus strong and vibrant through His Word and Sacraments is absolutely necessary.

We also need to become aware of the political situation that we live in. If you don't like the course of the current direction of our city, state, or country, you need to exercise your right as a citizen and as a Christian and let your voice be heard. I don't care what your political persuasion may be, we need to have our Christian voices be heard loudly and clearly once again.

Ultimately, as believers, we have the unique perspective of knowing how the story ends. Even if things seem to be going in the wrong direction, we know that Jesus has already defeated sin and Satan when He died on the cross for our sins. We know there is a home prepared for us in heaven when the trials and tribulations of this life have ended (and they will end!) We certainly enjoy the independence from our sins that Jesus won for us We are free! Let's use our on the cross. independence to become more and more dependent on God. The more we understand and appreciate this spiritual freedom, the more we know we need Jesus in our lives! Have a blessed and joyous 4th of July in the freedom of Christ!


Creation Corner

Intelligent Alien

Science fiction writers and UFO proponents like to propose strange looking aliens that can do incredible feats. The common octopus is a beautifully designed and incredibly intelligent animal that could compare to any alien of science fiction.



The octopus has no bones in its body, in fact, the only hard part of an octopus is its beak. That means that the octopus can take shape and any through almost any

opening. One famous example is an octopus that escaped from an aquarium in New Zealand. That animal picked apart the lid on its aquarium, crawled out, went across the room and down through a drain hole that led to the sea and has never been seen again.

Octopus arms are muscular, boneless, and lined with suckers that are covered with chemoreceptors similar to our own taste buds. An octopus can taste everything it touches. They live in oceans around the world from equatorial waters to Antarctica and the Gulf of Alaska and from deep-water trenches to shallow reefs.

The arms are also filled with neurons, so the brain cells of an octopus are in its arms and not its dome. The octopus has sacs of pigments which are controlled by the muscles. It can release this "ink" as a defense mechanism. Its arms also have cells that reflect and scatter light. That means an octopus can control what it looks like. It can resemble a sea snake, a fish, anemones, jellyfish, sand or seaweed. It is a master of disguise. In addition to the right color and form some octopus species copy the movements of whatever animal they imitate. The

camouflage does not seem to be accidental but is controlled by the octopus itself.

For a soft-bodied animal to survive in the ocean, some unique characteristics must be designed into its DNA. We think the number of features the octopus has is astounding. To have one unique characteristic might be possible - produced by a mutation and supported by natural selection. To have all of the abilities of an octopus would not happen by one mutation. Octopuses resemble an intelligent alien, and they certainly make E.T. look like nothing special. They give evidence of the Designer of life.

Continued History of St John Lutheran Church

On September 25th 2002, a call was extended to **Pastor Bryan Lundquist** (2002-2016) from Park Falls, Wisconsin. He accepted and moved to Berlin with his wife Shay and two children, Anastasia and Andrew. On Sunday November 24th 2002 he was installed as St John's 16th Pastor.

Soon after, St John developed a web site: sjlcberlin.com with links to the City of Berlin site. To keep up with the computer age, the school's computer lab was updated. Two more memorial gifts from the Leonard Jones Estate and the Bill and Alice Seeliger Estate, plus the faithful and generous giving to the new church fund by our members, reduced the balance and the last loan for the new church was paid off in 2016.

At the Quarterly Voters meeting on October 30th 2016 Pastor Lundquist requested a peaceful release to serve two sister congregations in Michigan's Upper Peninsula: St Paul, Laurium and

St John, Hubbell. He was granted a release with regret by the voters.

A call was extended to **Pastor Paul Mundinger** who became the 17th pastor to serve St. John.

Today, our school is a NSLA Accredited school with smart boards and computers in each classroom, a well stocked library and a 21-station computer lab. Our synodically trained, state licensed teaching staff consists of: Curt Snow Principal/5/6th grade, Melissa Linse 3K and Kindergarten. Julie Snow 4K, Charlotte Fritsch 1/2nd grade, Candice Schram 3/4th grade, Keith Krenke 5/6th grade and Valeria GeRue 7/8th.

Recently, the school exterior was painted, flooring in the 1st level was updated, new flooring also beautifies the Kindergarten room, plumbing updates were done, the entire school was re-lit, and a new boiler installed. The mission statement of our school is: "St. John Lutheran School exists to provide Christ-centered education focusing on spiritual, emotional, academic, social and physical growth. We assist parents in preparing students for an active Christian life and eternal salvation"


