Another Thanksgiving Day will soon be upon us. Of course we should be thankful each and every day of our lives, but on November 26th, we set aside a special holiday whose theme is to be thankful. We've got a lot to be thankful for. Sure...there's a pandemic going on. Some may have lost their jobs and the value of our retirement accounts might not be what it was a year ago, yet we are alive which means that we've had food, clothing, and shelter. It may not be what we've been used to but still God has been good to us.

I have to remind myself of these things often. It's easy, when we have been used to having more, to complain, grumble and gripe because things have changed. 1 Thessalonians 5:18 tells us that we should be thankful in all things - also stating that this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning us. Does this mean that we should be thankful for the bad experiences, tragedies, sicknesses, hurts and pains in our lives? I don't think we should be thankful for those negative experiences but I do believe that we should be thankful for how God brings us through them and for the lessons we learn from them.

Being thankful means that we give God the glory and we are grateful for today. But are we really thankful? We should be! You see, those who believe in God and trust Him, have been granted the privilege of being taken care of by Him. Even those who don't believe in Him and wouldn't even think about trusting Him benefit as a byproduct of His blessings.

Jesus told a story in Matthew 18 that illustrates how many live today. He told of a king who decided it was time for all his

debtors to pay up. One servant owed a great debt and the king knew that there was no way that this servant would ever be able to repay him in his lifetime. So he ordered this servant and his family to be sold as slaves in order to recover some of his investment. The servant fell at his feet and begged him for more time. The king felt sorry for the man and so he graciously forgave him all of it. He wiped his slate clean.

Now you'd think that this servant would have been grateful - but nothing doing. He left the king's court, went straight out to a fellow servant who owed him a small amount of money and demanded that he pay it in full right then and there. When he couldn't, this ungrateful servant had his fellow servant thrown into prison until he could pay up. Of course, when the king found out about it he did the same thing to this wicked, ungrateful servant.

We might say that we'd never do such a thing. Yet how often have we had hard feelings towards a fellow human being who might owe us, even after we have been forgiven such a great debt of sin towards our heavenly Father? Thanksgiving Day certainly commemorates being thankful. But we really know that we should give thanks every day for all our blessings especially the forgiveness and new life we believers have in Jesus Christ! Enjoy the turkey and the stuffing and the football on the 26th. But give thanks the other 364 days of the year as well! Have a blessed Thanksgiving


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

Our next meeting is Monday, November 16th at 6:30 at the church, we would love to see you there!




President Robin Henriksen opened the Thursday, October 1 meeting with a devotion on "each day is a glorious gift." In times of trouble we need to focus on God's presence.

The next meeting will be Thursday, November 5 at 1pm in the church lower level.







Human Care

It is a wonderful feeling when you are praised and appreciated. There are so many aspects of praise that send out radiant beams of joy. You feel happy and light in your heart when someone praises you. This praise might be channeled *directly* to you from a friend, a family member or someone for whom you did a service or good deed. It's wonderful!

Or, you might hear *secondhand* about a person who praised you to the skies to someone else. This, too, brings a good feeling to your heart. You are glad to be appreciated, and you are happy that you were able to render service to someone in need.

Sometimes, you might be praised not for doing anything, but for simply being the wonderful person you are! Your friends might thank you for your very presence! Nothing more. Just for being you! How satisfying to be extolled and lifted up simply for being no one but yourself.

It's easy to receive praise, but do you find it difficult to give praise? Some people do, including a conductor I know. Schedule permitting, I try to join a community chorus every Advent season - which begins next Sunday - to sing G.F. Handel's Messiah. A couple of years ago, we imported a guest conductor from Austin, Texas. He had recently retired, but had an excellent, national reputation as a choral conductor. He expected nothing but the best from his musicians, and so he was very sparing with his praise.

On one occasion, however, after a particularly excellent rendition in rehearsal of the final choral piece, "Worthy Is the Lamb," he congratulated the choir and the orchestra with an enthusiastic "Good!" We singers, and players, too, burst into spontaneous applause. The conductor's smile quickly vanished, and then became a frown, and he said, "Not that good."

I hope you do not find it difficult to give praise. Because God loves to receive praise. Read Psalm 100, the Bible reading for today. "Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise. Give thanks to him, bless his name" (v. 4).

Yes, as Thanksgiving Day approaches this week, let's ramp up our praise and thanksgiving to

God for all of his bountiful blessings, and for just being our God!

Prayer: God of great glory, power and majesty, I praise you today for your blessings bestowed not only upon me, but upon humankind since the dawn of history. You are great and deserve our worship and adoration! Amen.

Our volleyball team has finished their season. We thank players, parents, coaches,


and officials for their involvement in the season. The girls had a great season.

Creation Corner

From the Bi-Monthly Journal "Does God Exist?"

A regular feature of the journal "Does God Exist?" is a section entitled "Dandy Designs." Here are various examples from God's creation pointing to the undeniable existence of our Creator.

How Sea Animals Drink Water

Albatrosses and petrels are birds that can spend a year or more in the open ocean, but they need to drink water. Whales and seals also do not have land-based water supplies, and yet, like all mammals, they need water to survive.

So how do sea animals drink water when ocean water is salty? God's design of living creatures always includes unusual equipment to enable them to deal with their environment.



In the case of sea birds, they have a set of salt glands in their heads that connect to the bird's nostrils. The birds drink seawater, but the glands are so efficient that within three hours, all of the

salt is removed through the nostrils.

Whales and other aquatic mammals produce urine that has extremely concentrated salt content. By allowing high salt concentrations in the urine to diffuse into the ocean, the salt never reaches toxic levels inside the animal. An interesting sidelight to this is that the milk of these sea mammals is very low in water content. In that way, they conserve water. Milk from seals has only half the water content of lean hamburger.

Everywhere we look in the natural world, we see that a wonder-working hand has gone before. These marvelous designs are not the product of mindless chance. They show an Intelligence who created with purpose and wisdom.

In Job 38-40, God challenged Job to advance his understanding of God's power and wisdom by considering the natural things of creation. When Job questioned God's wisdom and purpose in his personal struggles, he did not recognize the wisdom shown in creation's design. We too need to look at what God has done and know there is a God through the things he has made (Romans 1:18-20).
