If you've ever seen the painting, *Rock of Ages*, you'll know it as a picture that expresses Christian security. The painting shows a woman in the midst of a terrible storm. The woman is clinging firmly to the Cross. Her face tells us that she knows the Cross will hold her securely in spite of the violent storms around her.

It seems as if we experience cataclysmic events throughout our country all of the time. Hurricanes seem to be battering our shores at regular intervals. Wild fires out west are reeking havoc in CA, OR, CO, WA and other states. Not only does the weather throw us great challenges from time to time, but our own culture seems to be in a sea of turmoil at every turn. Riots, vandalism, and looting seemingly happen everywhere. Things we used to value and hold dear no longer are seen as important by much of our country. Is it any wonder that our family structure is also being tossed about in a sea of uncertainty? And as a result, our stress level seems to be going through the roof!

We might rightly ask, to what can we hold on to in times of stress? Listen to the words of the Apostle Paul. I spite of the tremendous opposition, persecution, and affliction Paul was enduring, he was able to write these words to young Timothy just prior to being executed, "...I know whom I have believed and am convinced that he is able to guard what I have entrusted to him for that day." Paul also encouraged Timothy to, "...hold fast the words I taught you, as the example for you to follow, and stay in the faith and love that are ours in union with Christ Jesus."

Note the pronoun in Paul's words. He does not say, "I know what I have believed," but "I know whom I have believed." The supreme object of Paul's faith was Jesus Christ! He entrusted his life to the Good Shepherd, whom he knew and loved as the One who, "...laid down his life for the sheep." Paul could obviously say with confidence, just like King David, "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want..." Paul knew the Shepherd's promise: "My sheep shall never perish, neither shall anyone snatch them out of my hand."

The comforting words of Paul remind us once again that we can be calm and confident in the midst of calamities and troubles! We can trust our very being to the Lord who said, "I have redeemed you; I have called you by name; you belong to me." And so in every circumstance, we rejoice with Paul, saying, "I know whom I have believed."

Behind that pronoun stands the power, the love, and the mercy of Him who has promised to see us through whatever life may hold in store for us. Behind that pronoun stands Almighty God Himself, "...with <u>WHOM</u> nothing is impossible." He has pledged Himself to be with us every step of our lives. And you can't find a greater source of security than that!






I would like to remind everyone that "in person" worship and Sunday School is currently taking place. I encourage you to take advantage of these opportunities to worship and grow in your faith.

Have a great October. Enjoy the fall. Stay safe. Thanks the Lord for all our blessings.



#### Human Care

#### Scripture Reading: 1 Thessalonians 2: 1-8

In verse 7 of the reading above, the apostle Paul says: "We were gentle among you, like a nurse tenderly caring for her own children."

When you were a child, did you ever go to the doctor's office? Perhaps a doctor visited you in your home. They used to do that a long time ago.

If you went to see the doctor, did you like the doctor, or did you prefer the nurse? Doctors are very caring people, but sometimes they can be scary to a child. But the presence of a nurse helps considerably.

A doctor tells you that something is wrong. A doctor diagnoses a disease. A doctor prescribes a remedy. A doctor says you must take awful-tasting medicine. A doctor might operate on you.

But a nurse has a different role. A nurse stays with you. A nurse makes you comfortable. A nurse encourages you and helps you to feel better. A nurse will hold your hand. A nurse is sympathetic.

We understand the need for a doctor; but we often prefer the nurse.

People are like that. The apostle Paul understood this. His patient was the church at a city in Greece called Thessalonika. But instead of going to the church and barking out orders, making a diagnosis and calling for surgery, he and his friend went to the church like nurses. They were "gentle ... like a nurse tenderly caring for her own children."

This is a good lesson for us when we try to help others. People generally don't respond well to a friend who likes to explain what is wrong with you, and what you need to do. People like friends who have empathy, who are supportive, who spend time with them in their hour of need.

Most of us are called to be nurses, not doctors. We are called to weep with those who weep, to bear the burdens of others and to say an encouraging word.

Today, let's practice our nursing!

Prayer: Loving God, give me sympathy and encouragement to share with others. Amen. Oc

#### DID YOU KNOW...



One of the world's largest commercially available puzzles is now on permanent display in the Fellowship Hall of our church. The 51,300-piece puzzle measures over 28 feet long by 6½ feet high. It features 27 beautiful images of wonders from our planet Earth. Each picture contains 1,900 pieces. Some of the pictures shown are the Neuschwanstein Castle in Germany, St Basil's Cathedral in Russia, the Great Barrier Reef, the Great Pyramids of Giza, Machu Picchu in Peru and Niagara Falls. You're probably wondering who in the world would take on a project like this!?

in early April, when we realized that the pandemic was going to shut down our country for an extended period of time, Ally Wendt discovered the puzzle on the internet and approached her Dad, Jason, about taking on the challenge. The box, weighing over 60 pounds, and containing 27 individual puzzles, arrived a few days later and on April 21st work began. Jason and Ally were the main puzzle people. Jason's wife Susan, an essential worker at Theda Care-Berlin, would open each bag and flip all the pieces over. Each picture had a black border around it and 5-year-old Ryan would help his mother gather all the black pieces together. Each puzzle was a difficult challenge-some taking a couple of days to finish while others took much longer. Grandma Karen was recruited to help and managed to put 3 puzzles together by herself. She will attest to the fact that they were all extremely hard. On August 20th the last puzzle was finished. Now, Jason and his dad, Bob, were faced with another challenge: How do you hang a 28 -foot puzzle on a wall? First they built a wooden frame

and then, one by one, the individual puzzles were locked together and glued onto the frame. The entire 28-foot long puzzle was then lifted and mounted on the wall in our Fellowship Hall.

Eighteen-year-old Ally, a former student at St John, is now a freshman at UW Eau Claire studying to be a high school math teacher. Graduating third in the class of 2020, she enjoys doing crafts, watching movies, traveling (has been to Guatemala) and spending time with her family. Her dream is to return to be a math teacher at good old Berlin High and to see the world at every opportunity. Jason has a culinary degree from Fox Valley Technical College-Appleton and a BA in Hospitality and Tourism from UW-Stout. #### **Creation Corner**

From the Bi-Monthly Journal "Does God Exist?"

A regular feature of the journal "Does God Exist?" is a section entitled "Dandy Designs." Here are various examples from God's creation pointing to the undeniable existence of our Creator.

#### **Running a Cleaning Station**

Many of the jobs in the world are service-oriented. In the case of the bluestreak cleaner wrasse (*Labroides dimidiatus*), its ecosystem role is to provide an exceptional cleaning service to various fish. Its behaviors, characteristics, and impact are fascinating and indicative of design.

Adult bluestreak cleaner wrasses typically grow to



be 4 inches (10 cm) long. Their elongated body has a brilliant blue streak with a broad black band extending from the tip of the snout to the end

of the tail. Bluestreak wrasses are known to change color based on mood. For example, if the wrasse is caught on a hook and line, it may rapidly change color due to stress.

If there is one place in the ocean to look for the beautiful bluestreak cleaner wrasse, it's at cleaning stations. Those stations are populated by other cleaner wrasses and many different visiting fish. When a fish arrives at the cleaning station, the cleaner wrasse greets it by performing a dance-like motion. Visiting fish can immediately recognize the wrasse's intentions by seeing its lateral stripe and its movement patterns. The "client fish" adopts a specific pose that allows access to its body surface, gills, and mouth. The wrasse then cleans the fish by consuming ectoparasites. We find it fascinating how both parties agree to the terms and both benefit.

A male bluestreak cleaner wrasse will defend a reef territory and attract females to the area. The male must catch the female's attention by performing a beautiful mating dance. The male fish practices external fertilization when the female releases her eggs into the water. Fertilized eggs become planktonic larvae that move freely with ocean currents. In this way, the bluestreak cleaner wrasses continue to provide services to other ocean creatures in a wide area.

The wrasse's service job is quite an amazing process when you think about it. An ordinary fish will stop and allow a stranger fish to remove parasites from its body, and even from its mouth. Both fish benefit from the arrangement, and God's design of life is evident.
