He confessed his sin and received abundant forgiveness. ⁵ I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not cover my iniquity; I said, "I will confess my transgressions to the LORD," and you forgave the iniquity of my sin (Psalm 32:5).

All of us sinners know the damage sin can cause in our lives. Sin can cause to feel as if we're living in the midst of a drought where it's 110 degrees every day. Our energy is zapped and we begin to feel as if we can't go on. We only need to ask and we can also receive the refreshment that comes from confession and forgiveness. It's my prayer that all of us enjoy our time of rest and relaxation this summer. But also remember to make time to worship and receive the refreshment that comes from hearing God's Word, receiving His Sacrament, and enjoying His forgiveness. It's more comforting than drinking ice cold lemonade in a front porch swing! Have a blessed summer!



Creation Corner

From the Bi-Monthly Journal "Does God Exist?"

A regular feature of the journal "Does God Exist?" is a section entitled "Dandy Designs." Here are various examples from God's creation pointing to the undeniable existence of our Creator.

The Incredible Spider

In a previous "Dandy Design", we have had some discussion of the properties of spider webs and how the material is designed for specific jobs. Studies of spider webs have led to miracle fabrics and a variety of modern materials that have been useful in industrial applications. Experts say that the silk of an orb spider is so strong that a strand of it, if it were as thick as a pencil, could stop a jumbo jet in flight.

Most of us have a form of arachnophobia (fear of spiders), and yet these creatures do wonderful things for humans. The most obvious is the removal of insects from our homes and gardens. All spiders are meat eaters, and they are equipped in a unique ways to find and destroy massive numbers of insects. Most spiders have eight eyes that are arranged in a way to detect the primary insects they



are programmed to remove from the population on Earth. Spiders taste and smell through sensory organs on their legs. This enables them to identify

their prey without having to bite into it. Spiders hear by sensing vibrations through the hairs that cover much of their body. Spiders are so sensitive to vibrations that they can tell the difference between a moth and a honeybee hitting their web. Spiders can regrow a lost leg. They have bristled hooks on the ends of their feet that allow them to grasp their webs without getting stuck.

There are 38,000 species of spiders in the world. They range from the size of a basketball to the size of the dot at the end of this sentence. After they hatch, spiderlings drift away from the mother spider on a silk filament. We all know that spider bites can be nasty, but these creatures were created by God to control the insect populations on Earth. The technical knowledge needed to design such a creature is beyond human ability.

- •Think of a few people who have made you feel appreciated and special.
- •Think of five people you enjoy spending time with.

<u>Pastor Robert Schrader</u> (<u>Pastor Rob</u>)

After nearly 2 and half years of looking for a pastor, sorting through dozens of pastor information forms, and conducting countless interviews, the Call Committee talked about another option: going back to school. Each year, men from all over the country graduate from the seminaries and are placed in churches all across the country and world. The proposal was brought to the

congregation and it was approved to proceed with looking to the seminaries for a pastor while continuing to look from the field.

In January and February, Pastor Kyle and Mark Sbrocco (Head Elder) conducted interviews with five men who were scheduled to graduate at the end of May and be placed in congregations. The Call Committee was able to sit in on those interviews using Zoom.

After the interviews were conducted, the Call Committee gathered together in the middle of February to talk about each candidate and submit our list of men who we felt best fit the needs and ministry of St. Paul. Two names quickly stood out above the rest. We submitted those names and all the necessary paperwork to the district office and placement committees at the seminary and then we waited.

On April 27, during the Congregation Meeting, we were pleased to put the meeting on hold and watch the Call Service at Concordia Theological Seminary - Fort Wayne, IN. During that service it was announced that we would be receiving a pastoral candidate named **Robert Schrader**. "Rob" grew up in Berlin, WI and attended UW Lacrosse, WI where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Social Studies Education. After spending a year and half teaching history in Holcombe, WI, Rob felt the call to become a pastor. After two years of class work, Pastor Schrader was assigned to do his vicarage in Norman, OK at Trinity Lutheran Church. In July of 2020, he married Paige Jones, who is a math teacher from Coon Rapids, MN. Robert was the first choice of the Call Committee and we are super excited to welcome him as Associate Pastor.

Robert's Ordination and Installation will take place on July 11 at 3:00 PM, followed by a meal and opportunity to get to know Pastor Rob and Paige in the Fellowship Hall. We look forward to the ministry and blessings that he will bring to St. Paul and it's members, as we work together on the mission that God has given us of "Connecting People to Christ".
