Valentine's Day is approaching. And, with it, expectations for husbands to demonstrate their love and affection for their wives. I would like to suggest Ephesians 5:25-33 as a template for that love, not just for this Valentine's Day, but for the new year and beyond. Not only is it instructive in it's advice to the often relationally-challenged sex, I believe that it could be at least part of the very inspiration for romantic love. In verse 25, Paul tells the husbands in the Ephesian church, "Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her." No doubt every husband is familiar with at least one occasion (be it a novel or movie of some kind) in which their wife was emotionally affected from an account of two people in love where one person gives their very life to protect the other. Granted, that's the extreme example of love. Though we all would undoubtedly give our very lives for our spouse, there are even more practical applications to be found in this passage.

In verses 28-29, we read, "...husbands should love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. ²⁹ For no one ever hated his own flesh, but nourishes and cherishes it, just as Christ does the church..." Now, imagine what would happen if husbands were to begin loving their wives "as their own bodies." In other words, putting them before ourselves. What if the first thoughts in our heads each morning were of their welfare instead of ours? Besides making

every effort to provide for all of their needs and even most of their wants, it would undoubtedly mean seeking to make them comfortable in even smaller, yet important ways. Opening doors for them. Listening when they want to talk. Taking the kids out once and a while, giving mom a day, or maybe just half a day, to herself. Even a simple yet sincere "thank you" for a well-kept house and the many meals provided (and yes, I know some of you husbands cook and clean as well). For me, it would include helping with laundry without being asked. I'm sure each husband could think of at least one equivalent in their own relationship. And, I'm sure we could all agree that the little things sometimes earn the biggest dividends.

Pulling off a successful Valentine's Day is easy. A successful marriage, on the other hand, takes work. With the overwhelming evidence that the traditional family is in trouble in our society, today, I contend that it's up to the husband to take the lead in building a strong marriage, thereby greatly increasing the family's chance of success. After all, the children are watching. What might it mean to the future of the family, the church and even the nation if they grow up seeing Dad loving Mom as he loves himself? I'm not a prophet, but I'd imagine it would also pay great dividends. Have a blessed Valentine's Day!

Human Care

You might not be lonely during the long winter months, but it is quite possible that you have friends who are.

The Bible says that we are not alone - not you, me or your friends. God is with us, and as we were reminded recently during Advent, God entered our human experience as a baby in the manger, known as "Immanuel," meaning "God with us."

King David experienced the closeness of God throughout his life. In his well-known Psalm 23, he writes, "Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you are with me; your rod and your staff - they comfort me," verse 4. These words may be a reference to David's loneliness in his early days as regent of Israel. In another psalm he writes, "The LORD is near to the brokenhearted, and saves the crushed in spirit," (Psalm 34: 18).

For many people, especially those who are homebound or living in a life care center, one of the most distressing parts of the pandemic has been dealing with loneliness.

Visiting rules in many places have changed since the early days of the crisis in 2020. Even so, psychologists say that some of the most effective tools for helping people cope are pets, mindfulness and laughter therapy.

Believe it or not, robotic dogs have been used to combat loneliness in residents of care centers and hospitals. Yes! "Some of the most effective interventions in these settings involved weekly visits from an interactive robotic dog, which has proven to be as effective as a real dog in alleviating loneliness," according to one study of the subject.

But even better than a robot dog, or a real dog, are other therapies that include laughter, educational activities, some types of meditation and strategies to develop friendships.

A strong faith is a critical component to easing loneliness and often helps us to perceive the support that we had forgotten we had all along!

From St. John Lutheran School

Greetings from your school. February is the month that is connected with love. We think of flowers and candy and romantic dinners. Real love is God sending His Son into the world to redeem us. Please join us in sharing this good news.

We just finished a week of celebrating National Lutheran Schools Week. We went bowling and sledding. We watched a movie in the gym. We had special dress-up days. One day we dressed like our favorite book or movie characters. On movie day we wore our PJ's. Wednesday, we dressed up extra nice for chapel. Thursday, we had jellybean day. Each class dressed in a different color. It was a fun week to take note of what is special about St. John Lutheran School. We thank this congregation for providing all the support to operate our school.

We will be participating in the Wisconsin School Choice again this year. Families, who qualify financially, can send their children to St. John tuition free. The application window opens on February 1 and closes on April 21.

This year we are opening this program up to 4K students as well. We collect offerings at our weekly chapel service. We send those donations to a different mission project each quarter. We just completed the second quarter of our school year. Our school Christmas program had been postponed from before Christmas break due to quarantining classes. Then it got postponed again for the same reason. As a result, we decided to do

Our accreditation steering committee has been putting a great amount of time getting our documents ready for the validation team's visit on April 21st and 22nd. DID YOU KNOW



I'm sure most everyone knows that Julie and Curt Snow will be retiring when school lets out for the summer. The Snows came to Berlin in August of 1989 and have served their Lord here for 33 years. Julie has been the St John 4K teacher since the class was first introduced in the fall of 2009. She has done a superb job of teaching our little lambs. I asked what her favorite 4K activity is "The Gingerbread Hunt. We make and decorate the cookies, then take them to the school kitchen to be baked. When we come back to get them, they have mysteriously disappeared. There are, however, clues which we must follow and search through the school until we finally fine our gingerbread men right back in our own classroom!" I also asked her how teaching 4year-olds has changed since this pandemic began. "We don't sit together on the rug or at our old U-shaped tables anymore. Every child must now sit at their assigned desk and, of course, wear a mask at all times.

On March 6th 1959 Julie Kay Peterson was born during a good old Wisconsin snow snowstorm. It was so bad her parents, Leroy and Joan, had to pick up the doctor on their way to Sheboygan Memorial Hospital. Julie was the second child and first girl born to the Petersons. On March 29th, Easter Sunday, she was Baptized by Pastor Jagow at St John Lutheran Church in Fredonia.

When Julie was 6 months old, her Dad, an apprentice carpenter, bought a farm on Hwy 144 North of West Bend and the Petersons became dairy farmers. Julie's mother also worked at various jobs. Her favorite was managing the West Bend Co. Outlet Store.

Julie has 5 siblings: Rev. Roy Peterson works and teaches at Concordia University Wisconsin (CUW) James is a farmer and electrician, Tim; a carpenter, Janelle is a teacher at St Stephens Lutheran School in Horicon and is married to Rev. Mark Wenzel, Pastor at Grace Lutheran in Omro. The youngest girl, Dr. Jill Krell is a Nursing Professor at CUW.

Julie went to grade school at St John Lutheran School in West bend. Like most of the farming community, she became very active in 4H. On May 20th 1973 she was Confirmed by Pastors H.Wm Jordan and Mumm.

Summers were busy on the farm. "We had a huge garden with lots of sweet corn and sold produce from our road-side stand. The first money I ever earned was for picking pickles. People wanted the 3-4inch size to make pickles so that is what we picked. We were paid a penny a pickle and spent our money at the Fireman's picnics and the County Fair. "Actually, Curt corrected me and said we were picking <u>cucumbers</u>. Who knew? My Mother never called them cucumbers until they were too big to pickle."

The fall of her Freshman year, Julie went to Milwaukee Lutheran High School for one semester: then transferred to Kewaskum High. "At Kewaskum, we were only allowed one sport. I loved cheerleading and as a JV cheerleader I cheered for football, basketball and wrestling which allowed me to get around the one sport rule. Varsity had basketball and wrestling cheerleaders and both those squads cheered for football," Julie was wrestling cheer leader captain her

senior year. She was also President of her Senior Class. Still very active in 4H, she won a Grand Champion Ribbon for a Batik project as a Senior in High School and was also runner up for the" Fairest of the Fair" competition that year. Julie graduated from Kewaskum HS on June 3, 1977.

"Growing up, I felt that as a girl, my career choices were limited to nursing, teaching or secretarial and my typing sucked!! I always wanted to be a teacher." Julie enrolled at Concordia Teacher's College in St Paul, Minnesota. There she got a lot more than she bargained for. Her Freshman year she met a cute guy from South Dakota named Curt Snow who was dating another girl in her dorm. By March they were a couple and by their Sophomore year they knew they wanted to be married. Julie, however, didn't want to get married until after graduation. In May of 1981 she graduated with a BA in Education and a Minor in Art and 3 weeks later, on June 27th, she and Curt were married at St John Lutheran in West Bend.

Their 1st call was to Macomb County Michigan; a county that had more Lutheran Churches and schools than any other county in the USA. Julie taught 2nd grade at St John Lutheran in Fraser and continued her studies at Saginaw Valley State University where she earned a MAT. (Master of the Arts of Teaching) It was a very busy time for her as their first son, Dean was also born there. Four years later, a call came from St Paul Lutheran in Truman Minnesota where Julie taught 3rd and 4th grade. After their daughter Cassie was born, Julie stayed home and ran a Licensed Home Daycare until the Fall of 1989 when the call came from Berlin. After moving to Berlin, she continued her

Licensed Home Daycare until 2004. Brent and Alexandra were born during that time.

Shortly after moving to Berlin, Julie's Dad died unexpectedly from a massive coronary. When he didn't show up for evening milking, friends and family began searching for him and found him in a field next to his truck. He was 52 years old. After a time her Mother remarried and now lives in Kewaskum in the summer and Florida in the winter.

Today, along with their 4 children, Curt and Julie also have 6 grandchildren: Ava, Isaiah, Satori, Sophia, Jace and Wayne. They are looking forward to having more time for spoiling grand-children, playing cards, working on puzzles, listening to audio books and spending time with their family

The Snows plan to stay in Berlin after retirement. "We love Berlin and our St John family. Curt and I both enjoy Pastor's Sunday morning bible class and I also manage the scrip account and sell script cards after services each Sunday morning. "In the past, Julie also served on the call committee for Pastor Mundinger.

Julie and Curt love to travel together. In 2019 they enjoyed a European cruise from Budapest to Passau. They are hoping to do the "Footsteps of Martin Luther Tour" plus the Oberammnergau Passion Play this coming September. We wish you happy travels. Thank you for all that you have done for St John throughout these past 33 years. God Bless you both.

- Scissors




- 1. In order, layer the first five ingredients into the jar.
- 2. Trace the outline of the lid onto cardstock. Cut out.
- 3. On the card, write these directions: Remove wrapper from bouillon cube. Add contents of jar to saucepan. Add 4 cups water and a can of diced tomatoes. Bring to a boil over high heat, reduce to low. Simmer about 20 minutes, until barley is tender. Serve with parmesan cheese.
- 4. Place the card atop the lid. Screw on the canning ring to keep it in place.

Creation Corner

From the Bi-Monthly Journal "Does God Exist?"

A regular feature of the journal "Does God Exist?" is a section entitled "Dandy Designs." Here are various examples from God's creation pointing to the undeniable existence of our Creator.

Penguins of Danger Islands

Scientists were concerned that the population of this penguin species was declining until a recent discovery on the Danger Islands.

Adélie penguins (*Pygoscelis adeliae*) live on the perimeter of Antarctica. They have a "follow the Sun" migration. During summer in the Southern Hemisphere, they remain on the edge of the land. As winter comes on and the Sun moves northward, the ice fastened to the Antarctic continent extends farther north. Adélie penguins migrate northward at that time, following the growing ice so they can stay in the sunshine. In the spring, as the ice recedes, the Adélie remain on the edge of the ice as they migrate southward to their breeding grounds on land. For many of the Adélie penguins, their annual migration can be 8,100 miles (13,000 km).



Adélie are well adapted to their environment. Because they are exposed to very salty water in the desert of Antarctica, they have unique adaptations. They eat krill, which has lower salt concentrations, and their stomachs alter the ion

concentrations to reduce sodium and potassium ions. They feed their chicks with regurgitated krill that they have partially digested and desalinated. The adults concentrate the salts in their waste, and they have nasal glands that remove excess salt, which the penguins eject from their nostrils.

But what about the discovery on the Danger Islands? The Danger Islands of Antarctica should not be confused with Danger Island in the Indian Ocean. These islands are located at the tip of the Antarctic Peninsula. Explorers in 1842 gave them the name Danger Islands because they are

"guarded" by icebergs which are dangerous to ships. Scientists were concerned about declining numbers of Adélie penguins until they discovered 1.5 million of them nesting on the Danger Islands in 2018. That almost doubled the known population.

Scientists studied the Danger Islands population by using drones, which are not endangered by the icebergs. Human creativity, ingenuity, and curiosity have provided a way for us to study and care for these penguins that God has given the ability to survive in a hostile environment.

The many cards that they have sent to me, even continuing today, has been a constant reminder of their encouragement and love. As an engineer, I had come to the point of comfortable independence, but the blessings of receiving support like yours and my congregation on this path has been far greater.




