All four Gospels record the fact of Christ's resurrection, but they say little about why it matters. To understand the resurrection's importance, you must go to the rest of the New Testament, especially the epistles. Paul describes the importance of the resurrection of Jesus in Romans 4: "He was delivered over to death for our sins and was raised to life for our justification."

"Delivered over" is an expression used elsewhere in the Bible for God's judgment upon sinners, implying that Christ, who was without sin, became sin for us all, dying in our place. But the phrase, "He was delivered over to death for our sins," says nothing about our being forgiven. Our forgiveness is proclaimed in the next clause, "and was raised to life for our justification." "Justification" is a legal term, meaning that God, the Judge, declares you to be in the right, or "righteous," in his sight.

This is the chief article of the Christian religion, and it depends completely on the resurrection of Jesus. To be justified is to be forgiven and in a right relationship with God through faith in Jesus Christ, and that is why Easter matters. Jesus died for our sins on Good Friday, but our forgiveness became an accomplished fact on Easter Sunday.

Here's a football analogy to illustrate this. Many of us assume a touchdown is scored when the player with the ball crosses the plane of the goal line, but that's not really true. A touchdown is scored for the team only when the official who has the best view of the play raises both arms to signal

the touchdown. Only then is it official; only then are points awarded to the team.

That illustrates what happened on Easter, God the Father had the best view of Christ's suffering and death, and his raising of Jesus is equivalent to the official raising his arms to signal that the touchdown is good, meaning that forgiveness is now awarded to "team humanity." In other words, it does sinners like ourselves no good for Jesus to cross the goal line and die for us on Good Friday unless the Father officially approves of his sacrifice on Easter by raising Jesus from the dead. In raising Jesus, God shows that he accepts Christ's sacrifice for the sins of the world, and all who believe this good news are declared righteous before God.

This means that Good Friday and Easter are like two sides of the same coin. They cannot be separated. Without the death of Jesus for the sins of the world on Good Friday, there could be no Easter. And without Easter, Good Friday would not be good at all. Good Friday is incomplete without Easter. It's like half a coin: worthless. It would be just another day and Jesus would be just another forgotten victim of crucifixion.

But Jesus was not forgotten. On the third day, God the Father raised Jesus from the dead, and in doing so, God has awarded righteousness to sinners, won forgiveness for all humanity, and elevated Jesus as the supreme object of faith. Join us on Maundy Thursday (April 14th), Good Friday (April 15th), and Easter Sunday (April 17th) as we celebrate and rejoice in all that God accomplished for us sinners!



We are scheduled to have our accreditation validation team visit on Thursday and Friday, April 21-22. Please pray for a successful completion of this big project.


Junior choir and handbells are scheduled to aid in worship on April 24.

DID YOU KNOW.



This fall, instead of hosting public school 4K, we will offer our own 4K program taught by our own teacher. Beginning a new program of any kind can be challenging but God is watching over us and we have been blessed. Not only do we have a classroom that's furnished and ready to go but we also have a teacher in our midst. School Board member, Allie Henke, graduated from Fox Valley Tech in 2011 with an Associate Degree in Early Childhood Education followed in December of 2018 with a Bachelor's Degree in Early Childhood from UW Stevens Point. She is just what we needed!

Allie Kay Clewien was born at Berlin Hospital on September 17th 1987. Her Dad Bill, a cash crop farmer just south of Berlin, also maintains the Berlin School System buildings & grounds in the city, drives school bus and is the BHS swim coach. For the past 35 years, her mother Nancy has worked in food service for the Berlin Public Schools.

On October 18th 1987, Allie was Baptized by Pastor Adams at Grace Lutheran Church in Berlin. A younger brother, Ben and sister, Courtney completed the Clewien family. "I am the oldest and the shortest in the family. Growing up, I was always reminded of that!" Allie attended Berlin Public Schools from Kindergarten through 8th grade and was Confirmed by Pastor Peter Quello on May 19th 2002.

It was in grade school that Allie discovered swimming. "I was always in the pool and spent 13 years swimming competitively. I was a WSI swim instructor during my upper high school and college years and I am also a

swim coach. I was very passionate about swimming. When it became time for me to get a job, of course, I was a life guard!! I was paid around 8 or 9 dollars an hour which, at that time, was one of the highest paying jobs available to someone my age and I thought that was very cool!" Allie still holds a few record times from swimming at BHS. "I learned a lot more than just how to swim fast. Being on the swim team taught me dedication, determination, and how to be respectful." In 2006 Allie graduated from BHS and that fall enrolled at UW Oshkosh. "I had high hopes of swimming and leaving my mark in their pool but major shoulder surgery ended my swimming career." Allie was devastated and decided to take a couple years off. She found a job working in daycare.

Phil and Beth Sass, former coaches of the Berlin Barracuda Swim Team, own Wisconsin Spice CO. Allie's parents used to clean the offices at the Spice company and she would go along and help them. One of the 2nd shift employees, Adam Henke, always seemed to be in the break room when they were cleaning. "Adam, would sit on the table and visit with ne while I mopped the break room floor. I called him "Island Boy" because he would be stuck there until the floor dried." Spending time together when one works 2nd shift and the other is always working or in school can make dating difficult. On Allie and Adam's first date, they shared a romantic dinner of subs in Adam's car during his break. They found a way to make it work and on August 18th 2012, they were married at Grace Church by Pastor Scott Piper.

Allie went back to school, earning her Administrative Credential in 2013. In the midst of working and going to school, she and Adam also had 2 children; Jaycee Margaret in 2015 and Braxton Matthew in 2016. Both children have gone to our school since 3K. Alle was a preschool teacher for a while; then worked at several daycares. She became a Director at Little Sprouts Discovery Center in Redgranite and then came to Berlin Community Day Care in 2016 and became a Director there.

In December of 2019, she opened Young Stars Childcare. At first there were 2 locations, one in Green Lake and the other in Markesan. Last fall they merged into one at the Markesan location because of staffing problems. "Everyone is having problems finding staff. The day care field has been hit extra hard by the shortages. Our dream from the beginning was to provide something different than what was currently out there. I am so passionate about children's education and since 90% of brain activity happens before age 5, young children need that educational boost. Our goal of raising the bar is not only for the children but the staff as well and it's happening right here in Green Lake County." Allie Henke.

Adam, Allie and their 2 children joined St John in February of 2021. "I love the warm and welcoming community St John creates

for its members whether they are old or young." Allie was welcomed onto the Board of Ed last June. Board of Ed projects at the moment are to hire a new 5/6 grade teacher and make the dream of a new playground become a reality. This will be Allie's last month on the Board. As the new 4K teacher she will become an employee of the school and needs to step down off the board. Personally, Allie's long-range plans include a Master's Degree. "Education is important to me and I would like to continue to educate myself so I can be the best teacher possible." At St John, Allie has already subbed for teachers at the school and Sunday School and helped with Easter Crafts and end of the year projects.

At home, she loves to "Bring Back to Life" old antique items and do crafts. She still likes to swim and recently has started doing yoga and meditation. A meal out will probably be at Culvers or Shepards during "Shepard Season." She and Adan like to travel and enjoy driving so they can see what's interesting along the way. They have taken their children to the Black Hills and have visited Florida several times. The Ark Encounter is on their short list for the future.

Allie, thank you so very much for serving on the Board of Ed. We hope your new position as 4K teacher will be a rewarding and pleasurable experience.

Creation Corner

From the Bi-Monthly Journal "Does God Exist?"

A regular feature of the journal "Does God Exist?" is a section entitled "Dandy Designs." Here are various examples from God's creation pointing to the undeniable existence of our Creator.

How Strong is the Ant?



Scientists in Krakow, Poland were amazed to see a single ant holding a dead bird in the air that weighed 500 times more than the ant did. That

would be equivalent to a human who weighed 200 pounds holding 50 tons in the air. A number of questions are raised by such a discovery.

The first question might be why such a huge force would ever be needed by the ant whose colonies can number a half million individuals and cover six square miles. To feed such a colony, large prey is needed and transporting that prey efficiently requires force. We do not deliver a load of gravel a piece at a time, and neither does the ant.

The second question might be how do they do it? The secret turns out to be in the ant's feet where electron microscopes reveal powerful suction pads called arolia between the ant's tarsal claws. Other ants have arolia, but the adhesive characteristics of the weaver ant's arolia give it the unique ability to support huge loads.

Ants have many lessons to teach us. The power of unity and cooperation, the importance of the wise use of resources, the value of keeping busy and not wasting time, and the incredible wisdom built into the design of all living things by their Creator. "Go to the ant, thou sluggard; consider her ways, and be wise:" (Proverb 6:6).


The Love of Christ (TLC) Fund


