Scripture Reading: 2 Kings 2:1-2, 6-14

Not long ago, I found myself stuck on a Saturday afternoon in a large electronics store. The store was thick with shoppers, and salespeople seemed nonexistent. I was there not as a curious browser or a casual shopper; I knew precisely what I wanted, knew precisely where the item was located in the store, and knew precisely that even on a good day it would take me an hour to get out of the store!

I found the software I was looking for and incredibly bumped into a salesperson at a little kiosk in the middle of an aisle near Cell Phones/Fax Machines. He asked me if I had found what I needed. I said that I had. He wrote down a few numbers; I gave him a credit card and signed the receipt. He handed my purchase to me, and said, "Okay, you're good to go."

I stared nonplused. "You mean I don't need to stop at the front cashier?"

He smiled. "No, you're good to go." He meant that I could shoulder through the crowds and slip through the door. I could leave with my small purchase and bypass the milling masses and be far from the madding crowd. I could cut to the chase, cut through the red tape, avoid the mess, make a clean getaway. I was good to go.

His comment rang in my ears as I looked at today's text. The reading is about two good-to-go guys: Elijah and Elisha. One was getting ready to check-out, the other preparing to check-in. One was taking off, the other taking on; one giving up the mantle, the other putting it on; one crossing the Jordan for the last time, the other for the first time. Two good-to-go prophets, voices for God at a critical moment in Israel's history.

We are not sure why it was time for Elijah to check out. His transition from this earthly sphere to the heavenly one was part of the divine plan. He was ready to go. He was good to go.

Perhaps we are not at this point yet. There remains more for us to do in this world. But we know that the day will come when God will say to us: "My child, you are good to go. Well, done, good and faithful servant!"

In the meantime, we can prepare for that day when we will be "good to go."

Prayer: O God, in a sense we are preparing for our departure from the day we were born! But, realistically, we are much closer to glory now than we were at birth. Help me to prepare for my homegoing, and to have peace in my heart, as I finish the course set before me. Amen.

DID YOU KNOW...

Billi Jo Malzhan-Kaufman was born February 17 1976. Her Dad Richard, worked with Drilling and Blasting in the Berlin area and Mother Lynn was a paramedic in Emergency Services for the City of Belin and Waushara County. Billi grew up with one older sister Stacy and a younger brother Andrew. She was raised in that carefree time when children safely played outside all day long and only checked in when they got hungry. Many summers were spent on her Grandparent's farm and she grew up loving animals and being in the country.

Billi attended Clay Lamberton Grade School. and later babysitting She enjoyed lifeguarding through Berlin's Park and Rec. Dept. working mainly at the indoor pool and for1 year at the outdoor before the new Aquatic center was built. Through the summer migrant program, she also taught swimming lessons. At Berlin High School, Billi was a cheerleader, did the lighting for BHS musicals and was an officer for the FFA. Her teacher was Mrs. Candice favorite Neumeier. "She was a great teacher and very caring. She really helped me survive those awkward teenage years!"

Billi and Shawn were "High School Sweethearts" One day, in the high school cafeteria, Jennifer Handrich-Klettke introduced Billi to Shawn Kaufman. "My 16th Birthday was coming up and my 2 girlfriends were going to spend the day with me. They both had boy-friends with cars,

who were going to drive us to Oshkosh for a movie and dinner at the Ponderosa. I didn't want to be the only one without a date. Shawn seemed like a nice guy so I called him up, out of the blue, and asked if he would like to go along. He said YES! We dated for 6 years. I took religion classes from Pastor Heinrichs and was Confirmed. I'm not sure Shawn knew what he was getting into but "He put a ring on it" and we were married by Pastor Heinrichs and Shawn's Uncle, Pastor Robert Bernhardt on September 26th 1998."

Editors note. Shawn cane into the Ladybug regularly to purchase yellow roses for Billi. My employee called him "The Cute one!" They were such a nice couple and The Ladybug was honored to do their wedding flowers.

After graduating in 1994, Billi attended UW Madison. Like so many young students, she still wasn't sure what she wanted to do for a career so she took the Farm and Industry Short Course and received a "Specialty in Dairy Farm Management Degree". Billi found a job working for a large dairy north of Wild Rose. Then, for the next 5 years, she "Fell into a job" working as a veterinary Assistant in Omro. "I can honestly say I, still didn't know what I wanted to do when I grew up!" Billi and Shawn decided to open a gift shop in downtown Berlin which they ran until Billi obtained her realtors license in 2005 and ioined Coldwell Banker. About this same time, their son Karson was born followed 8

years later, by their daughter Violet. Balancing work and a career is not easy but Billi seemed to thrive on it. Did she finally find what she wanted to do for the rest of her life?

In 2011 Berlin's Coldwell Banker office was acquired by First Weber Inc. Their office is open in the strip mall across from Kwik Trip and in spite of her health issues, Billi is keeping busy there.

Both Karson and Violet attended St Jon School and Billi served for many years on the Board of Ed. She has also worked with the Human Care Committee, and was on the committee that called Pastor Mundinger. Shawn is our in-house electrician and always ready to help if needed "Each of the boards I served on taught me so much and helped me grow in my faith. I am so grateful to have been entrusted with those positions" Billi Kaufman

The little girl who grew up loving the country is now living her dream. Shawn and Billi have a beautiful home they built on the Kaufman farm, overlooking the Rush Lake Marsh. They raise chickens in a chicken coop that was built by her Grandpa and Dad. Lucy, the Gordon Setter also lives there along with 2

cats. "One of then loves Shawn and the other cat tolerates our family."

In 2018, Billi was diagnosed with stage 4 colon cancer that had metastasized into her liver. She had 8 inches of her intestine removed, followed by 6 months of Chemo and in March of 2019 was considered cancer free. However, by December the cancer was back. Another 3 months of chemo was followed by a 10-hour surgical procedure during which her abdominal cavity was flushed with a chemo wash to hopefully destroy any loose cancer cells. After the surgery, another three months of chemo was administered. Today, Billi lives with cancer. She takes a medication that has kept the cancer cells in her body at a minimum. She will likely be going through more infusion treatments in the future.

"We all know that our time on Earth is temporary but some of us are more acutely aware of this fact than others. It took my illness to become more aware of my own mortality and I envy Christians understanding of this via the Holy Spirit. I have learned to love more fiercely. Creation Corner

From the Bi-Monthly Journal "Does God Exist?"

A regular feature of the journal "Does God Exist?" is a section entitled "Dandy Designs." Here are various examples from God's creation pointing to the undeniable existence of our Creator.

Zebra Stripes

A child said that a zebra is a horse in striped pajamas. Of course, zebras are not horses, and they do not wear pajamas. But have you ever wondered why zebras



There are at least five possible answers to that question. Probably the best known is so they can hide in the tall grass. But not all zebras live in areas with tall grass. Also, their main

predators (lions and hyenas) are more likely to smell zebras before they see them.

Another possibility is that the stripes help to repel flies. In a study published in 2020, researchers tested that theory. They draped solid-color rugs on some horses and striped or checked rugs on others. They found that fewer flies landed on the horses with striped or checked rugs, and those biting African horseflies carry diseases that can be fatal for zebras.

Still, another idea is that stripes help zebras stay cool. The black and white areas create differences in heat exchange patterns causing air to move over the zebra's body.

Every zebra has a different stripe pattern, similar to every person having a different fingerprint. So maybe this allows the zebras to identify each other. We do not have to look at people's fingers to tell who they are. Instead, we look at their faces. However, zebra faces look pretty much the same except for those different stripe patterns.

Maybe those stripes work in another way to evade predators. Perhaps they fool predators by what is called "motion dazzle." A bunch of striped zebras moving around might confuse a predator in the way a person can become confused or dizzy watching striped objects in motion. So it makes

sense that it would be hard to pick out one animal in a herd of moving zebras.

So if we wonder why zebras wear stripes, the answer is—we do not know for sure. But why are those light and dark hairs so nicely arranged in beautiful stripes instead of being mixed together, resulting in a dull gray appearance? People appreciate beauty, and since we are created in God's image, he must also be a fan of beauty. I want to suggest that God just likes to add a little extra flair to his creations. Perhaps that is why zebras wear stripes.


