On April 23, 1891, in Philadelphia, a 24 page hand-written book was purchased at public auction. It was valued because of its author. The book was titled <u>The Daily</u> <u>Sacrifice</u>. It was a book of prayers that also contained petitions for morning and evening of each day of the week.

Here are a few of the prayers contained in the book: "Pardon, I beseech Thee, my sins. Remove them from Thy presence as far as the east is from the west, and accept me for the merits of Thy Son, Jesus Christ." Another prayer said this: "Remit my transgressions, and cover them with the absolute obedience of Thy dear Son, Jesus Christ, offered upon the cross for me." One more: "I humbly beseech Thee to be merciful to me in the free pardon of my sins, for the sake of Thy dear Son, my only Savior, Jesus Christ, who came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance."

Who do you suppose wrote these reverent prayers? Was it some great preacher? No, these prayers were written by George Washington at age 20. These prayers reveal Washington's personal faith in Jesus as his Savior and his gratitude for the grace of God that brought him into God's kingdom.

When people become citizens of the United States, they renounce loyalty to the land of their birth and pledge allegiance to the United Sates and its Stars and Stripes. That can be an emotional experience. It some cases it means a dramatic move from tyranny and dictatorship to the assurance of rights and freedoms in the land of the

free. They are happy to be a part of what makes America so great!

We are proud to call George Washington the "Father of our Country." We are thankful for all his effort and sacrifice in leading the colonies to independence and into their first years as the United States of America. He is an example to all of us in his dedication to the principles that have made our country great.

On the basis of his book of prayer and other indications, Washington was also dedicated in his relationship to God through Jesus Christ. He had renounced sin and self and had given his allegiance to God's kingdom of grace. In this, he also stands for us as a good example.

St. Paul, grateful for his own release from sin, wrote, "Give thanks to the Father, who delivered us from the power of darkness and translated us to the kingdom of his dear Son." The Greek word for "delivered" indicates an exercise of strength which makes one sweat and become exhausted. It points to the cost of God's Son for delivery.

Our political freedoms and especially our Spiritual freedom in Christ did not come easily. Jesus gave us everything so that we could have "freedom" in Him. As we rejoice and celebrate our freedoms this 4th of July, let's never forget the most important freedom of all – our salvation through faith in Jesus Christ! Have a blessed 4th of July!



Human Care

Scott Powell, Senior Fellow at the Discovery Institute in Seattle, reports that most people are unaware that when the 56 members of the Continental Congress signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, "they were in fact signing their death warrants." The British regarded the declaration as treason, and the penalty was death.

This is why the identities of the signers, except for John Hancock and Charles Thomson, were withheld from the public for more than six months. Powell continues: "What prompted the Continental Congress to begin displaying all 56 signatories of the Declaration can be traced to Washington's determination and success three months later at the Battle of Trenton in December 1776 ... Perceiving this a miracle and harbinger of more victories to come, and perhaps with apparent taking to heart of the last sentence in the Declaration that 'with a firm reliance on the protection of divine providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor,' the Continental Congress ... began posting the fully-signed copies of the Declaration throughout the 13 colonies in January, 1777."

Our forebears of 246 years ago "placed everything on the line and trusted the Almighty for the results." Powell cites the eminent British historian, Paul Johnson, who observed: "The Americans were overwhelmingly churchgoing, much more so than the English, whose rule they rejected. There is no question that the Declaration of Independence was, to those who signed it, a religious as well as a secular act."

Today, we are blessed as a nation, although we are not perfect. We still strive for fairness and justice. We still try to lift up the fallen and give hope to the downtrodden. I firmly believe that most Americans would give their neighbors or even a stranger the shirts off their backs. Yet, we also know that the struggle for freedom continues, and it should never stop. Only in a great country does such a quest endure.

Prayer: O God, today I give thanks for the freedoms I enjoy. Help me to enjoy this freedom responsibly, and always be respectful to others. Amen

St John Sunday Evening Club 1938 – 1999

The St. John Sunday Evening Club was organized by a group of members seeking Christian Fellowship and an opportunity to provide service to their St John congregation. Under the direction of Pastor Martin Strasen, the very first meeting occurred on Sunday October 30th 1938 at the home of Erwin and Linda Ehrlich. Elections were held at that meeting with Erwin Ehrlich elected President; Erle Vanderhoff Vice President; Laura Neitzke Secretary and Frieda Ludwig Treasurer. Pastor Strasen would be the Spiritual Advisor for the Club. The last Sunday of the month was chosen as the meeting night, dues would be 10 cents a month and Forty-seven people became charter members.

From the very beginning, the Club was concerned with assisting the church and school. At the second meeting, a Constitution was drawn up and accepted. It listed four objectives:

- 1. To assist, in any way, the home congregation.
- 2. To promote growth in Christian knowledge through educational programs.
- 3. To foster Christian love and fellowship, and provide material for wholesome entertainment.
- 4. To encourage and support missions and charitable endeavors within the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod.

The meetings always began with the singing of a hymn followed by the Pastor's talk on church related topics. A business meeting followed and lastly a guest speaker would give a talk. When all the business was finished, the playing cards were brought out for some wholesome entertainment. In the beginning, SCOT was the popular game for men while the ladies preferred Smear. Sometimes Cootie, Mouse, Court Wisk, Bunco, or Yahtzee replaced the cards. In later years, Sheepshead was played by all; in fact, 15 decks of cards were purchased during this period and marked "For Sunday Evening Club Members ONLY"

Clarence Braun was elected as the 2nd President of the club. Pastor Strasen received a call and left for Ebenezer Lutheran in Milwaukee. We called Pastor William Eggers from Cleghorn WI who arrived in 1940 and became the Club's 2nd Spiritual Advisor. Before Pastor Eggers arrived, four rooms in the parsonage were wallpapered by the Sunday Evening Club members.

The first church picnic was held at the cottage of Otto & Frieda Ludwig on Hills Lake and all members of \$t John were invited. This became an annual affair until the death of Mr. Ludwig in the late 1950's. After that, picnics were held at the Mt. Morris Retreat where the young member's Walther League Society was usually challenged to a friendly game of baseball or basketball by other church members.

Sunday Evening Club members held Halloween parties, hay rides, housewarming parties and snow mobile parties. Christmas Parties were held each year with special entertainment and invited guests. For many years, Erwin Ehrlich dressed up as Santa Claus, passing out gifts for the

children and guests. With the arrival of Pastor Schedler in 1955 it was quickly discovered that he was very sensitive to what he called "Satan Claus" or "Santa Flush" and Santa never again appeared at the club's Christmas Party.

The Club always followed the goals set forth in its Constitution. The first being "To assist in any way the home congregation." The first assistance occurred shortly after organizing when the Sunday Evening Club purchased a new light for the school hall at a cost of \$17.82. The 2nd project was a light for the pulpit.

Through the years, the St John Sunday Evening Club has purchased or built many items for our church including the very first Communion railing used in church and a new lectern. Both were built by a carpenter from Westfield and the lectern is still being used in our altar area. A guest registry was purchased and club members built a stand to set it on; they also built wooden candelabras that attached to the ends of each pew down the churches center aisle. These could be used for weddings and other celebrations. A vacuum cleaner for the church was donated as well as 50 steel folding chairs to be used for extra seating when the pews were full. A new typewriter was donated for Pastor and the Host Box and Flagen used for Communion were resilvered. The Club donated \$500 to the organ fund in 1968 and also contributed to the church's indebtedness. Members built a handicap ramp on the north side of the church; new hymnals were purchased and old ones were repaired by Club members. Card tables were purchased, \$700 was given for the new organ chimes and for St John's 75th Anniversary, the Club purchased a copy of "The Lutheran Handbook and Agenda" which they gifted to the church. In 1966 the Club donated \$4000 to the church centennial fund and paid for new carpeting in the church.

In December of 1948, Pastor Eggers accepted a call to St Paul's in Oconomowoc and Pastor Herbert Baker from Symco, came to Berlin. He became the Club's third Spiritual Advisor and also became famous for his rendition of a "HoBo" at one of the club's Halloween parties.

To raise money for their many projects, the Club held regular Bake Sales, Rummage Sales and Paper Drives. In 1951, they were seeking new ways of raising funds when two very active members, Minnie Keehn and Mrs. John Krause suggested the Club consider having a Chop Suey Supper. Minnie was the head cook at the famous Whiting Hotel in downtown Berlin and Mrs. Krause was known for making the best coffee in Berlin. She always used the old-fashioned coffee pots and added an egg or two for the proper taste. Their suggestion was accepted and the first Chop Suey Supper was held in the school cafeteria. The event was open to the public; tickets were \$1.00 for adults, 50 cents for children and approximately 100 people were served. It was quickly decided to make the Chop Suey Supper the Club's annual event and the last Wednesday before the start of Lent was chosen as the date. The second year's profit was \$86.43 and the third \$218.24. By the late 1980's between 700 and 800 people were being served. with an average profit of around \$3000.

Many school projects were also supported by the Sunday Evening Club. In the early years, they shared a bill for decorating the school hall and kitchen with the Ladies Aid; the work being done

by volunteers. They donated 85 new hymnals to the school, made hangers so the children could hang their coats up, purchased a mimeograph machine and a new electric typewriter, built some carts for storing folding chairs and bicycle racks for the children. The Club refinished the school floors, purchased new lights, installed a new hot water heater in the kitchen, donated a dishwasher, a steam table, commercial gas stove, new dishes & silverware including 10 dozen teaspoons to replace those resting in the landfill and helped pay for a set of encyclopedias. They removed overgrown shrubs and barberry bushes around the flag pole so the school children could raise and lower the flag each day without becoming injured: then planted new shrubs to beautify the school. They hired Schmude Electric to update the wiring in the kitchen, built cupboards and storage space in the cafeteria and donated money for computers and software. They also built 30 banquet tables out of plywood with metal legs. These tables were all made in Clarence Braun's basement with Arnold Harke supervising. The tables are still being used today.

In 1955 Pastor Baker accepted a call to Koehler, WI and the Cub's new Spiritual Advisor became Pastor Arthur Schedler, from St Johns' Lutheran in Shawano. It was decided to drop the 10 cents a month-dues in 1958, allowing members to make a free-will offering instead.

In 1959 the basketball program was started at St John. Garvin Shields was the coach until 1961 when he left for the service. Bill Handrich took over for him. The team competed against other Berlin City teams and with parochial schools in the area. In 1970 The Sunday Evening Club sponsored the East Central Wisconsin Lutheran Basketball Tournament netting a profit of \$2574.36. The club then painted the gym, purchased bleachers, added acoustics and still had enough money left to donate \$300 for driveway repair. Later, the Club purchased playground equipment and a fence for around the play area. They gave \$150 for new mats in the gym, \$50 for new sports uniforms and paid for the removal of asbestos panels in the gym. Then they gave money to purchase new panels and in 1987 paid \$324.55 for an energy control air compressor.

In 1963 The Sunday Evening Club celebrated their 25th Anniversary with a potato pancake supper and a delicious Anniversary Cake made by club member Alice Janes. On another occasion, the men of the Club decided to treat their ladies to a pancake supper. The men did all the cooking and to serve them, a waiter in aa tuxedo, complete with a white napkin draped over his sleeve was there to help.

The 2nd and 3rd goals of the Constitution are "To provide Christian Knowledge, foster Christian Fellowship and wholesome Entertainment." These goals were constantly met at every club meeting and on hay rides, Halloween costume parties, picnics, bowling, playing basketball against the youth of the church and staging 1 act plays in the early years that were open to the public. Bill and Donna Moldenhauer arranged for a visit from Berlin's first AFS student and that tradition continued for many years.

In 1973, Pastor Schedler accepted a call to LaValle WI and Pastor David Meyer, Clara, their 3 boys and Shep the d,og moved into the Parsonage. Pastor Meyer immediately became very active as the new Spiritual Advisor for the Club.

The Sunday Evening Club started the church Newsletter in 1973 and paid for all Newsletter expenses, including postage to mail the newsletter to every member's home until mailboxes were installed in the new church. In 1974 they helped to purchase new carpeting, storm windows and paint for the vicarage and some new flooring and counters were also installed in the parsonage. Many "house-warmings" were held during the 60's and 70's when club members building new homes were honored with a visit from the Club and a living tree or shrub that could be enjoyed for years to come was given as a house-warming gift.

To "Encourage Missions and other Charitable Endeavors" The Sunday Evening Club donated to the Gerhardt Kirst Education Fund and in an effort to bring Christ to thee nations, became a loyal supporter of the weekly broadcasts of "The Lutheran Hour" and "This Is the Life" television program. The Club joined the Lutheran Layman's League, which member Arnold Lohse was a big supporter of. He found many speakers who came to Berlin and talked at their meetings. The Club paid for LLL broadcasts on Ripon's WCWC radio as well as Pastor Meyer's "Morning Meditations" over WISS. They held LLL Rallies and placed Lutheran Hour welcome signs at the entrances to Berlin, giving visitors directions for getting to St John church and donated to the Lutheran Hour float in the Rose Bowl Parade.

On Confirmation Sunday, during the church's centennial year, The Sunday Evening Club paid for flowers on the altar and purchased an LLL membership for each Confirmand. They also gave a \$1000 to a new mission church in Plainfield.

In 1985, Pastor Burnell Eckardt was called as our Associate Pastor. He, his wife Carol and their sons became the first to purchase their own home in Berlin rather than live in the Parsonage. After Pastor Meyer retired in July of 1997, the parsonage sat empty for almost a year. It was then cleaned in preparation for St John's last Vicar, Clark Brown, his wife Martha and family. Soon after they left the parsonage was sold.

On October 30th 1988, the Sunday Evening Club celebrated their 50th Anniversary. Almost 80 people attended including 7 charter members. After a buffet supper, a nostalgic program called "This is your Life" complete with skits was presented by Arnold Kretzmann and various club members.

In 1990, the Club and the Ladies Aid shared the cost in purchasing St John placemats to be used for the Chop Suey Suppers and other events and in 1993 they donated \$1000 toward a computer for Pastor Eckardt. A new \$3200. back door addition for the school was paid for by the Club and the banquet tables were refinished.

In 1996 Pastor Kenneth Heinrich from Spooner, WI replaced Pastor Eckardt as the new Assistant Pastor. A contribution of \$700 was made to the Organ Chime Fund in 1997. Also thee sign on Hwy 49 south was replaced and another \$300 given for "The Lutheran Hour" broadcasts on WISS radio. Pastor Meyer retired in July of that year and moved to West Bend leaving Pastor Heinrich as the sole Pastor at St John and the Club's final Spiritual Advisor. In 1998, \$3000 was contributed for kitchen renovation and another Nesco Roaster was purchased for the chop Suey suppers.

On Sunday October 18th 1998, the Sunday Evening Club celebrated their 60th Anniversary with a party at Berlin's Mascoutin Country Club. All past and present members were invited to the celebration and dinner. Anniversary Committee members were: Arnold & Jeanette Kretzmann, Bill & Donna Moldenhauer, Merlyn & Vera Soda and Bill & Shirley Handrich. As the evening drew to a close, President Bill Handrich stated. "THERE YOU HAVE IT!! BUSY—YOU BET! FUN—AND HOW! Creation Corner

From the Bi-Monthly Journal "Does God Exist?"

A regular feature of the journal "Does God Exist?" is a section entitled "Dandy Designs." Here are various examples from God's creation pointing to the undeniable existence of our Creator.

Designing Pearls

When a grain of sand or a tiny bit of debris enters a mollusk's shell, such as an oyster or mussel, the creature goes into a defensive action to protect itself from the irritating particle. As a result, the oyster deposits a crystalline form of calcium carbonate known as aragonite. The smooth layers of minerals and protein that the mollusk deposits on the foreign particle are called nacre (pronounced NAY-ker). The layers of nacre take on a beautiful, iridescent, and shiny appearance that gives pearls their beauty.



The question that has bothered scientists for more than a century is how the oyster can change a jagged or lopsided fragment of grit into a perfectly round and smooth pearl. Recently, a research

team studied pearls from Akoya pearl oysters (*Pinctada imbricata fucata*) in Australia. First, they used a diamond wire saw to slice the pearls in half. Then they polished the cut surfaces and used various electron microscopes to study them more carefully than anyone had done before.

One pearl they studied had 2,615 layers of nacre deposited over 548 days. The pearl was only 2.5 mm in diameter, so the layers were extremely thin. They found that the mollusk modulates the thickness of the nacre layers according to "power-law decay across low to mid frequencies, colloquially called 1/f noise." That means the mollusk uses math to adjust the thickness of the layers to compensate for irregularities.

One of the researchers, Laura Otter, a biogeochemist at the Australian National University, said: "These humble creatures are making a super light and super tough material so much more easily and better than we do with all our

technology." Using calcium carbonate and protein, oysters make nacre 3,000 times tougher than the raw materials. Understanding how mollusks make pearls could lead to a new generation of super materials for use in spacecraft or solar panels. Once again, design in nature gives us some valuable insights. Thanks to the Designer of nature, even lowly mollusks can teach humans some lessons.


