Most of you know that I'm a big football fan. Packers and Badgers. I'm a true homer. Before the first game is played, I have high expectations for both teams. Anything less than Super Bowl and Rose Bowl wins will be a bit disappointing! My, how times have changed in the Badger state for football fans. (Remember the 70's and 80's anyone?) In my 24 years of being a pastor, I've had many people ask me to include a prayer for a Packer victory in my Sunday morning prayers. As tempting as that might be, I've never done it. And why not, you might be thinking? Can't God grant all prayers if He wills it (and certainly He must will the Packers to beat the likes of the Bears and Vikings)? Well, here's why.

First, it is a misunderstanding to believe that Christians never have to face loss, tragedy, or heartache. And trust me when I say that for many people, seeing the Packers lose on Sunday can wreck the rest of their week like nothing else can! The message of the Bible is not that those who follow God will have an easy life and no losses. The biblical record includes many instances of toil and sacrifice in service of the Creator. However, the rewards of that toil and

sacrifice far outweigh the cost.

The apostle Paul (a man few could deny served God with all his heart, soul, mind, and strength) experienced much trouble during his ministry. Paul writes, "Five times I received at the hands of the Jews the forty lashes less one. Three times I was beaten with rods. Once I was stoned. Three times I was shipwrecked; a night and a day I was adrift at sea..." (II Corinthians 11:24-26 ESV) Nevertheless, the apostle Paul could say with confidence: "For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us." (Romans 8:18 ESV)

Through the difficult times and the easy times, Jesus promises to be with believers every step of their walk. Jesus himself said that his followers will have difficulties in this life, but we should not worry, He is in control: "I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world." (John 16:33 ESV)

Is the point of Christianity merely the attainment of worldly successes?
Should people line up at the church doors in hopes of securing financial stability, a successful love life, or a myriad of other selfish pursuits?
Wanting to win football games is not a proper motivation for becoming a Christian. That is a selfish motive and in direct conflict with our real need of forgiveness of sin.

Actually, I believe it's impossible that one could even truly become a Christian simply in order to win football games, be successful, or any other self-centered reason. If one comes to God seeking only to fulfill their own selfish desires, their heart is unable to believe and trust in Jesus. A person who is motivated purely by selfishness finds humility an incredibly difficult pill to swallow.

In order to remain a Christian, one must recognize their own sinfulness, their own inability to fix themselves, and Jesus Christ's payment on the cross for their sins. Then, only when one humbly trusts that Jesus paid the debt they owe but are unable to pay, will they be forgiven and begin living their lives, as forgiven Christians.

What people really need more than football wins is to be forgiven for the sin that prevents them from having a right relationship with God in the first place. Through all of life's ups and downs, God is still God and He still loves us. He either causes or permits everything that happens, and He does this for His own reasons, not ours. He also promises that

He will be with His faithful believers through everything they experience. He will comfort and strengthen His people.

Having said all that, winning football games is a fun thing to experience. We can and should pray for the players that no one gets hurt. But in the big scheme of eternal life, a thorough trouncing of the Bears or Vikings (or 49'ers) does not hold a candle to a saving relationship with Jesus Christ! Enjoy the upcoming games. And may the best teams (Packers & Badgers) win!



If you're like more than one-third of Americans (in some surveys, the number of higher), you are looking forward to Thursday. Why? Because September 22,2022, marks the beginning of autumn, or the fall season.

Of course, this is an arbitrary date. It is the beginning of the *astronomical* season of fall. The *meteorological* start of fall is September 1, and the season consists of September, October and November. This latter designation makes more sense to me, so I have been in a fall mood for three weeks already!

But why do people like this season more than the others? First, think about your own response to that question. You might find your reasons in the following list.

Watching the leaves change color / The chill in the air / Drinking hot chocolate / Making homemade soup Beginning to cook holiday foods / Watching Halloween movies / Wearing big sweaters / Listening to the sound of rain on my roof / Lighting seasonal candles / Baking pies / Having cinnamon apple food/drinks / Making pumpkin pie / Having pumpkin spice food/drinks / Drinking hot apple cider / Carving pumpkins / Wearing chunky socks and boots / Stepping on crunchy leaves / Wearing plaid/flannels / Baking pumpkin bread / Going "leaf peeping" / Having a backyard campfire with friends / Seeing my breath when walking outside / Roasting marshmallows / Eating candy apples / Taking fall-themed photos / Seeing frost on the grass / Going pumpkin picking / Eating pumpkin seeds / Wearing scarves / Getting ready for the holidays

Many of these reasons resonate with me. How about you?

The changing of the seasons is another sign of the profound depth of the Creator's mind.

When I discern through my sense of smell the autumnal changes in the air, or catch a whiff of my wife's pumpkin pie cooling on a rack, I praise God, and lift my thanksgiving to the heavens.

In Psalm 104, we read, "You have made the moon to mark the seasons; the sun knows its time for setting" (v. 19; see Daily Bible Readings on today's Activity page). Yes, God made the seasons, and so, like the psalmist, you and I can praise God: "I will sing to the LORD as long as I live; I will sing praise to my God while I have being. May my meditation be pleasing to him, for I rejoice in the LORD" (vv. 33-34).

Prayer: Creator God, thank You for the wonderful signs that accompany the change in seasons. These are always a reminder that You take care of all that You have made. Amen.

Did You Know...



Our new 5th & 6th grade teacher first taught at St John in the 1980s. She also coached girls' basketball and in 1988 their team won the Conference Championship. "The trophies were nice but the time we spent with our team was the best" Jayne Kersten

Jayne Elizabeth Frauenhoff was born in Aurora, Illinois on October 14th 1950. Her parents took their new daughter to St Paul's Lutheran Church in Aurora where she was Baptized by Rev. Walter Stallman. Jayne's father Richard was a design engineer and her mother the church Secretary at St Paul's. Jayne, the oldest, has one younger sister Jean and one brother John.

Jayne attended parochial grade school at St Paul's. She loved sports but was limited to only watching as in those days' girls didn't play sports. She also enjoyed reading, playing cards, Monopoly and being a Girl Scout. On Palm Sunday, March 22 1964, Jayne was Confirmed by Rev. Richard Osing at St Paul's.

She attended East Aurora High School where her interest in sports continued. Since she was a little girl, Javne wanted to be a teacher like her

Grandmother. She joined the Future Teachers of America Club and did well in school thanks to great teachers like Mrs. Gray/English, Mr. Melon/Math and Mr. Babich/Chemistry. She graduated on June 6 1968. Jayne's first job was working as a cashier at the National Food Store for 90 cents an hour.

That same Fall she enrolled at Concordia Teacher's College in River Forrest; Illinois She graduated with a BA degree in Physical Education and Math & Education. She then continued taking various classes in the math educational field.

Her first call came from Clintonville, WI and there she met and fell in love with their third-grade teacher, Robert Kersten. On August 4 1973 Robert and Jayne were married at St Martin Lutheran Church in Clintonville. In 1979 they accepted our call to Berlin and taught here from 1979 to 1989. Robert mainly taught the middle grades and Jayne 6th to 8th. Robert shared Jayne's passion for sports and began coaching the boys' basketball team. In 1985 the team had an undefeated season.

During those years, St John School enrollment was around 170 students. The Kerstens became friends with the parents of many of their students and attended several student Confirmations and a few weddings. For 8 summers Jayne worked at Greenings Grocery in Berlin. She was also a Receptionist and Counselor at the Jenny Craig Weight Loss Center.

In 1989, a call from Lancaster, California had them "On the Road Again" Later, they accepted a call to West Bloomfield, Wisconsin where Robert served as Principal and Jayne the teacher.

Serving their Lord as teachers, Robert and Jayne have taught over 1000 students. During her 40 year career, Jayne taught in 10 different parochial schools; St. Martin in Clintonville, Mt. Hope in Park, Michigan, Gospel Lutheran in Milwaukee, St John, Berlin, Grace Lutheran in Lancaster, California. Ascension Lutheran, Torrance, California, Christ Lutheran West Bloomfield, St John Lutheran in Ionia Michigan, Zion Lutheran, Matteson, Illinois, and St Luke in Montgomery, Illinois.

After retirement, Jayne worked as a substitute teacher for 10 years at a Hispanic School in East Aurora Illinois.

"It was a very eye-opening experience!" In 2012, she also became the Chairperson of the Northern Illinois Teacher's Conference working with over 500 teachers.

The Kerstens have always loved living in small towns and had wonderful memories of their time ministering to the people from our area. When it was time to finally retire, their thoughts turned to Berlin. We know God works in mysterious ways and Jayne is now back in school and ready for her next big adventure. Since returning to Berlin, she has also joined the LWML and Altar Guild while Robert sings in the choir and is working with the Human Care Committee. They still love sports and enjoy watching basketball & football games on TV. You might find them having dinner at The Olive Garden, their favorite restaurant.

"Now, we see many of our former students and it has been fun reminiscing with them. A lot of our memories come from the coaching we did; the boys' and girls' teams and the cheerleaders with their many trophies. The best thing however is seeing how our former students have grown in their faith. It's special when we see them in church and hear about their lives." Jayne Kersten.

Creation Corner

From the Bi-Monthly Journal "Does God Exist?"

A regular feature of the journal "Does God Exist?" is a section entitled "Dandy Designs." Here are various examples from God's creation pointing to the undeniable existence of our Creator.

A Powerful Shrimp

They have the force to break an oyster shell or the glass of an aquarium with a single blow. Because of their powerful claws, people who have tried to pick them up have called them "thumb splitters." Their real name is peacock mantis shrimp (Odontodactylus scyllarus). They are essential predators in shallow tropical and sub-tropical waters from Guam to East Africa.



Peacock mantis shrimp use their claws like hammers to smash their prey at 10,000 times the acceleration due to gravity. The

supersonic motion of the shrimp's claws creates cavitation bubbles. Those tiny bubbles of water vapor collapse at supersonic speed, making shock waves that cause a second impact on the victim. This action creates not only sound waves but also small amounts of light. The cavitation force can be greater than the initial impact of the hammering by the claw, and it can damage steel boat bottoms and propellers.

The kind of force that peacock mantis shrimp can produce is not possible with muscle motion. Mantis shrimp use a saddle-shaped spring to release the energy in milliseconds. But the spring is no good without the muscular power to load the spring. But that is not enough because there also has to be a trigger to catch and then release the spring. All three of those parts must be in place to activate the

powerful hammer.

The design of this system goes even further. If the shrimp released that energy with an ordinary claw, it would smash the claw to pieces. So the claw has to be designed with super strength and a flexible joint system to allow motion at supersonic speed. All of those things must be designed into the shrimp simultaneously for the system to work. This design gives evidence of a Master Engineer.

New Business::


- Rich Wallner reported that the annual audit is in process at the time of this meeting and is going well.
