Scripture Reading: Matthew 3:13-17

There is an old Spanish saying which goes, "Por la boca muere el pez." Literally, this means "the fish dies by its mouth." If the fish had kept its mouth shut, he would not have ended up in the frying pan or mounted on a wall.

We can get into a lot of trouble sometimes because we open our big mouths. Truth is, it is more important that we do the right thing, than say the right thing. We are defined by what we do, not what we say.

Let's say that a man comes home one day, and his wife, who had arrived from her job only minutes earlier, notices that the expression on his face is grim. He marches past her on his way to the kitchen. He opens a cupboard and slams it shut. He rattles a drawer looking for some-thing. He kicks at the dog. She asks him, "What's the matter?"

"Nothing."

"How was your day at the office?"

"Fine."


Do you suppose the wife believes the words her husband chooses, or the behavior he has acted out since he came home? The behavior. The non-verbal action will always be believed rather than the verbal when the two are in conflict. Truly, actions do indeed speak louder than words.

Francis of Assisi once invited a young monk to join him on a trip to preach in a nearby town. . The monk was honored and readily accepted the invitation. All day, the two monks walked through the streets and alleys of the town and even ventured into the suburbs. They rubbed shoulders with hundreds of people.

At the end of the day, the two headed to a monastery for the night. The young monk was puzzled that Francis had not even once addressed a crowd, nor had he talked to anyone about the gospel. Greatly disappointed, his young companion finally said to Francis, "I thought we were going into town to preach."

Francis responded, "Oh, but we have preached. We were preaching while we were walking. Many saw us and our behavior was closely watched. It is of no use to walk anywhere to preach unless we preach everywhere as we walk!"

Prayer: May my life, O God, be a living witness to Your love, grace and mercy. Help me to act out the good news so that both my words and my life are in harmony. In Jesus' name. Amen.

Creation Corner

From the Bi-Monthly Journal "Does God Exist?"

A regular feature of the journal "Does God Exist?" is a section entitled "Dandy Designs." Here are various examples from God's creation pointing to the undeniable existence of our Creator.

Musical Tree

It is the tallest species of spruce and one of the tallest species of trees in the world. These trees are commonly used as tonewood for various musical instruments. The Sitka spruce (*Picea sitchensis*) lives to be very old and outrageously tall.



Sitka spruce trees grow along the western coast of North America from Sitka, Alaska, to northern California. The tallest specimen is 315 feet tall (96 m) and resides in Olympic National Park, Washington. Old trees may not have branches lower than 98–131 feet (30–40 m). They

have thin scaly bark, and their needles are arranged spirally along the twig.

Sitka spruce is the most important timber species in Alaska. The wood is valuable for use as turbine blades for wind-driven electrical generators and masts for sailboats as well as musical instruments. Sitka spruces are also a critical component of the health of the ecosystem. Sitka spruce forests provide habitat for a large variety of mammals, birds, reptiles, and amphibians. The forests foster hiding places, thermal cover, and a natural snow screen. Many species would be in jeopardy of habitat loss without the towering trees and vast forest canopy.

Because Sitka spruce is fast-growing, it is a top choice for reforestation efforts. When the tree is reintroduced to regions, it has massive effects on other organisms. Sitka spruce trees remind us that healthy, plentiful forests are part of God's design for the Earth. He provides for both man and animals within His creation. The tree's structure and wood type create excellent acoustic properties for use in guitars, violins, and pianos. Sitka spruces are beautiful trees that give us beautiful forests and help us create beautiful music.




Would you like your stewardship to be automated? St. John enables you to give your church offering by using electronic funds transfer (EFT).



A. Reserved Fund Report - by Rich Wallner

- Transfer of Children's Fund to General Fund to cover costs for the playground project.
- Cindy Schuett requests to move Hymnal Fund to Music Ministry Fund.
- Total reserve funds available at the end of the quarter is \$318,545.44.

Motion by Debra Thiel to accept the Reserved Funds report. Second by Rebecca Mosier. Motion approved.

Old Business (none)

New Business

- Mike Schrader spoke on behalf of the Trustees regarding the need to replace a controller for the HVAC system at church. Cathy Young explained that the current system installed when the church was built (1999) to control HVAC on/off and temperature settings is experiencing delays and requires manual resets. While the systems have been updated, the technology associated with its operation was not. Mike Schrader made a motion to update the controller for the HVAC, at a cost of \$4,900. Cathy Young seconded. Motion was approved.
- Rich Wallner explained Pastor Mundinger represent the congregation at the LCMS Conference and any election of
 officers thereof. The congregation also needs to designate a lay person voter for the election of Synod President and
 Vice President. Kevin Koch has volunteer to be the lay person. The deadline for submitting the vote to be counted is
 February 28, 2023. Rebecca Mosier made a motion to nominate Kevin Koch, second by Tina Markowski. Motion
 approved.
- Federal Mileage Rate for 2023 is \$0.656 per mile.
- Tina Markowski spoke on behalf of the Board of Christian Education with regards to hiring staff replacement following the resignation of Mrs. Cargin as the 3rd/4th grade teacher. The Board is recommending Rachel Barry who has 20+ years of experience in both public and parochial school settings. She is synodically trained and currently rostered, requesting to be considered a called teacher. Motion by Debra Thiel to extend a call to Rachel Barry, second by Adam Ewald. Motion approved.
- Tina Markowski also spoke to the need to consider adding another classroom to accommodate the increase in enrollment of the lower grades. Currently, there are 26 students in the combined 1st and 2nd grades. Five families with children were turned away this school year due to classroom size being at capacity. The board is recommending to split the 1st and 2nd grades into two classrooms, converting the former computer lab into a regular classroom. With that, it's recommended that we hire an additional contracted teacher. There were questions about the difference between a Called or Contracted teacher, enrollment trends, availability of teacher candidates, budget planning. In answer to those questions, the historical 6 year enrollment has been increasing, we have reserved funds available to assist with salary increases and additional staff, should it be needed. Motion by Terri Billington, second by Debra Thiel to approve the hiring of an additional teacher. Motion approved. Mrs. Jayne Kersten has agreed to return next school year, filling in as 5th and 6th grade teacher. The board continues to explore candidates to permanently fill this position as well.

Motion to adjourn was made by Curt Snow, second by Debra Thiel. Motion approved. Meeting adjourned at 11:16 am, closed with the Lord's Prayer.


