As I write this month's newsletter article, Holy Week just over a month away. But I'm pretty confident I know how things will go beginning with Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday. We will come to church and hear the Passion history once again. We will see the tremendous love that God has for us by sending His Son to suffer terribly and die a horrible death - all on account of us. We will have rejoiced greatly on Easter morning with the festive music of Easter and the Good News of Jesus' resurrection from the dead.

On Easter Sunday there will be the traditional large crowds in worship at St. John hearing this Good News. We certainly praise God for His faithfulness to our church throughout the last 150+ years. We have much to be thankful for during this time and there have been many fine achievements accomplished by our congregation during that time. To God alone be the glory!

But what does the future hold for the next 150 years at St. John? What kind of church does God want St. John to be for ourselves and for our community? Certainly we need to continue doing the many important things we do to care for the sheep already in God's fold. Preaching God's Word, administering the Sacraments, and Bible based teaching will always remain central to our purpose. But what about the unchurched? What about those who have no church to call home and therefore aren't hearing the Good News we are privileged to hear each week? Consider the following facts regarding unchurched people, some of which may surprise you:

- 1. Research shows that most unchurched people have a very positive view of church and pastors.
- 2. The vast majority of unchurched people would respond very positively to a kind Christian willing to spend time with

them to foster a non-judgmental relationship.

- 3. 82% of unchurched people would respond positively to a church invitation—if invited! However, only 21% of active church goers invite anybody to church in a one year period. Of those, only 2% actually invite an unchurched person.
- 4. Most unchurched people don't have anyone to tell them what Christianity is all about.
- 5. Most unchurched people feel guilty about not going to church but stay away because church intimidates them.
- 6. The vast majority of unchurched people would prefer to worship on a Sunday if asked.

What do these facts tell us? They tell us that there are many unchurched people in Berlin just waiting to be invited to church so they can learn about Jesus Christ. I believe that our future years need to be devoted to being a harvest minded church. This will involve developing relationships with people which will enable us to talk freely to the unchurched about our faith and church. People want to hear what we have to say. God wants to use us to be His mouth. Please pray that God would place people in our lives who are unchurched. What better time to invite someone to church to hear the Good News of Jesus? And let the Holy Spirit guide you as you do God's work in their lives. Have a blessed Lenten season!



There's an old story about a farmer, who, when asked to lead prayer in church, would end with a peculiar statement: "And, O Lord, prop us up on our leaning side."

His pastor asked him what he meant by that. He explained: "I've got an old barn, and it's been there a long time. It's been through a lot of storms, and the bugs have eaten at it. I got to looking at it one day, and I noticed it was leaning to one side. So, I thought to myself, this can't be good: it's only a matter of time before it falls.

"So, I got some pine beams, and I propped it up. It still leans, and probably always will. But it's not going to fall down because I supported it on its leaning side.

"I got to thinking about it," he went on. "I thought about the kind of year I've had, and some of the storms I've been through, and some of the people who are bugging me - eating away at my joy. And I got to thinking, I'm still here! I'm still standing after all I've been through. The howling winds: they couldn't topple me. It's because God's grace was propping me up on the leaning side."

Perhaps it was this same idea that prompted Anthony Showalter to pen the lyrics, together with Elisha Hoffman, of the old and well-known hymn, "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." Showalter said (according to an article in Wikipedia) that "he received letters from two of his former pupils saying that their wives had died. When writing letters of consolation, Showalter was inspired by the phrase in the book of Deuteronomy 33:27, 'The eternal God is thy refuge, and underneath are the everlasting arms."

What a fellowship, what a joy divine, leaning on the everlasting arms;

What a blessedness, what a peace is mine, leaning on the everlasting arms.

Refrain: Leaning, leaning, safe and secure from all alarms; Leaning, leaning, leaning on the everlasting arms

Prayer: Thank you, O God, for knowing the "joy divine" of being supported by Your "everlasting arms," supporting me on my "leaning side." Amen.

March 15 - Senior Choir will host with hot turkey sandwiches, salads and desserts.


March 22 - Altar Guild and LWML will host with chili, chicken noodle soup, sandwiches and desserts.


President Robin Henriksen opened the February 2 meeting with a devotion on share your love. Tell your friends and relatives how much you love them and you care how they feel.

Creation Corner

From the Bi-Monthly Journal "Does God Exist?"

A regular feature of the journal "Does God Exist?" is a section entitled "Dandy Designs." Here are various examples from God's creation pointing to the undeniable existence of our Creator.



Plants use a wide range of methods to spread their seeds. Some plants have seeds encased in a shell or a fleshy bundle that various animals, including humans, like to eat. We are all familiar with nuts and fruits, but the basic design of these foods is to spread their seeds. If you live in an area where poison ivy is a real nuisance, getting rid of it this year will not stop it from being a problem next year because birds eat the berries and replant the ivy all over your property. For good or bad, plants spread their seeds.

Plants that shoot their seeds use one of the most interesting methods of seed disbursal. The seed pod in the picture is from the sandbox tree (*Hura crepitans*) nicknamed "the dynamite tree" because of



the explosive way the pods burst open. In the segments of the pod, the outer and inner layers grow at different speeds. This creates tension as the surfaces push against each other. When the seeds are ready, the pressure becomes so great, that the capsule explodes. The sections that were initially convex rapidly flip to concave in a process known to engineers as snap-buckling. That explosion can shoot the seeds 100 feet (30 meters) at speeds of 160 miles (257 kilometers) per hour.

Measurements of snapping plants show a g-force of 2400. Fighter pilots can handle about nine gs before passing out. A wide variety of designs allow plants to shoot seeds or snap shut to trap food.

Plants spread their seeds by many amazing mechanisms God has built into them, and which scientists are still trying to understand.



An old spiritual song asks this question: "Were you there when they crucified my Lord?" In all honesty, we have to say no, but soon St. John will have a different answer to that question.

St. John Lutheran Church will be hosting *Journey* to the Cross, an Easter learning experience on Saturday, April 8 from 9:30 – 11:30 AM for children age 3 to grade 6. Our Easter Egg Hunt will follow at the school.

As a traveler, you have the opportunity to walk in Jesus' footsteps during Holy Week. Smell the aroma of anointing perfume, taste Passover food, feel a crown of thorns, and so much more. You will hear about Jesus from Bible witnesses and be a part of the Passion experience.

- Call meeting for selected committee members is scheduled for March 2nd. Pastor nominees have been received from congregational members and will be considered as part of the call process.


