This week I couldn't help but notice some pictures that some of our La Crosse friends posted on Facebook of the Mississippi River. The river is well past flood stage and has crept into the park in downtown La Crosse. It got me thinking about the poor barge captains that have to navigate this river with the added current the flooding would certainly bring.

I've spent a fair amount of my life on rivers. I've kayaked down the Fox River. I've piloted a 62 foot houseboat on the Mississippi. And I've been on more pontoons and runabouts than I can remember. It's kind of cool to think about all of the riverboats and other craft that have navigated these same waters for over a hundred years. I can only imagine what the Fox River looked like back in the day when goods were transported from Oshkosh to Berlin via barges. No doubt scenes like this inspired Mark Twain to write as he did about life on the Mississippi.

In a way, we're all writing a story. Some of us are adventurous, others are steady and sure. But all of us have twists and turns and bends in the river.

Maneuvering through life, like a barge on the river, can be difficult at times, even treacherous. Undercurrents (sins) want to steer us in other directions and want to tug at our hearts to send us off course. As we follow Jesus, like the

disciples, we will encounter a lot of bends in the river. Bends come in the form of choices, priorities, commitments, even apathy. Bends challenge us in the areas of faith; forcing us to examine our traditions and conventional thinking. It happened all the time with the disciples, **"follow me"** said Jesus, **"and I will make you fishers of men"**. **"Follow me, and let the dead to bury their own dead"** **"Follow me" but if you do so, you must deny yourself and you must take up your cross."**

Living the Christ-like life is not for the faint-hearted or the uncommitted. We all fall under the temptation to go our own way, do our own thing, or hold on to ideas and traditions that make us feel good and keep us in our "comfort zone." Jesus constantly pushed the disciples to grow in every aspect of their lives but primarily in their faith. As long as we are walking this earth we will encounter waves of influences, both good and bad, but unless we are truly grounded in the Word of God will we fall into every temptation. Matthew, Mark, and Luke all record Jesus' warning **"Pray that you may not enter into temptation"**.

As we travel down this river together, it's so important that we love each other through the bends in life; helping each other identify dangers in the river. Then the world will know us by our love. So by all means follow Jesus – and let the river flow!

Many of you have asked about how our call process for the next Pastor of St. John is going. We are still, as of April 26, waiting for the district office to provide us with the information on the candidates suggested by our members and those they feel may be a good fit based on the self-study materials provided by the call committee to district back on March 8.

This may be frustrating, but we must be patient and remember that we are still blessed with a wonderful pastor while many congregations are vacant.

At our last voters meeting the Board of Christian Education proposed hiring an additional full-time teacher which would enable the school to have separate 1st and 2nd grade classrooms. The congregation approved, even though it was explained that the additional staffing would probably require using a significant amount of reserved funds during the next fiscal year.

Since that meeting our projected number of School Choice students has grown to the point that the proposed budget for our next school year includes only the limited amounts of reserved funds normally spent on expenses for which they were designated.

Honor your mother

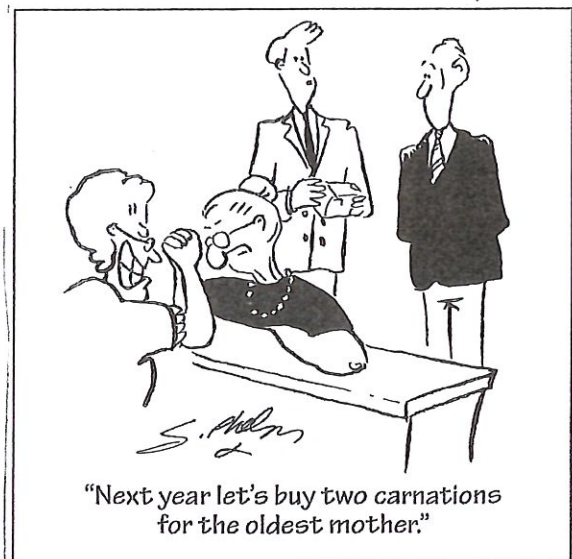
Anna Jarvis, the woman who first suggested a national day to honor mothers, had an incredible mother to honor. Her mom, Ann Reeves Jarvis (1832-1905), was a Sunday school teacher and activist who helped lower infant-mortality rates in Appalachia and promoted friendship among families of Civil War soldiers.

At a memorial service for her mother, Anna Jarvis distributed carnations — her mom's favorite flower — to attendees. Her idea to set apart one day each year for moms gained traction, and in 1914, President Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday of May Mother's Day. It was customary by then to wear white carnations in honor of departed mothers and red carnations to honor the living.

Of the white flowers, Jarvis said they "symbolize the truth, purity and broad-charity of mother love; its fragrance, her memory, and her prayers. The carnation does not drop its petals, but hugs them to its heart as it dies, and so, too, mothers hug their children to their hearts, their mother love never dying."

School office hours over the summer will be Mondays through Thursdays 8:00am – 1:00pm.

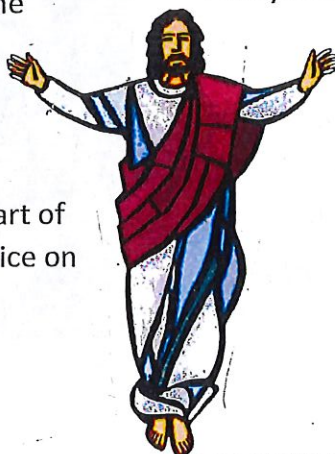

Each destination allowed the children a hands-on experience with 12 different aspects of Jesus' journey to the cross where He ultimately died for the sins of the world.

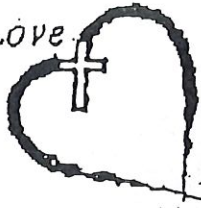
As the children moved from one stop to the next they received a stamp for their "passports." At the end of the journey they had a new and fresh perspective on what Jesus endured as He took our sins from us.

How would we like God to mother us? What sort of maternal oversight do we prefer the Almighty to exercise over us?

Some of us are inclined to visualize God as the consummate helicopter parent: always hovering overhead, training a spotlight on us to highlight our misdeeds. This is a stern, judgmental ruler, the ultimate micromanager - surveying our lives with disapproval, swift to mete out punishment.

Yet, what if God relates to us in a very different way? What if God is more like Rabbi David Wolpe's concept of a *helium mom*, holding gently to the end of a string as we dance on the wind - currents?

Thankfully, God doesn't seem all that interested in micromanaging our lives. To the contrary, the Lord seems content to leave us alone for long periods, with only the lightest of tugs on the balloon string. Sometimes that touch is imperceptible, barely there. At other times - episodes of trouble or temptation, in particular - we may suddenly feel a strong pull on the line, calling us back into closer relationship.

Truth is, the Bible tells us how we want God to mother us. It tells us how we want God to take care of us.

With love, of course! But what kind of love?

A love that is specific to us. "You did not choose me but I chose you" (John 15: 16).

A love that gives us a job. We loved it when mom gave us a job, didn't we? Our kids loved it when we gave them responsibilities, too. God has given us a job, or we might say, a mission.

A love in which we remain. "Now remain in my love" (v. 9). Jesus says we remain in his love, when we obey his commands (v. 10).

A love that asks us to play nice and share. "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you" (v. 12).

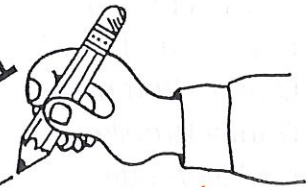
A love that is sacrificial. "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life" (v. 13). When we think about all that our mothers did for us, well ... it's amazing!

Creation Corner

From the Bi-Monthly Journal

"Does God Exist?"

A regular feature of the journal *"Does God Exist?"* is a section entitled *"Dandy Designs."* Here are various examples from God's creation pointing to the undeniable existence of our Creator.

Amazing Chickadees

If you have a bird feeder on your property, you are probably familiar with chickadees found throughout the United States, Canada, and Mexico. The six North American chickadee species do not have large fat reserves like some birds. Instead, their trim size gives them more mobility to evade predators such as cats or sharp-shinned hawks. However, it also means chickadees must find enough fuel daily to maintain their metabolism.



One way chickadees survive is by lowering their body temperature at night. A chickadee's daytime body temperature is 108 degrees Fahrenheit, but it drops to around 86 degrees at night. This controlled hypothermia is a nocturnal semi-hibernation that slows their metabolism by about 25%. The next day, they must find enough food to maintain their daytime metabolism while replacing fat lost the previous night.

Besides the seeds at our bird feeders, chickadees eat caterpillars, insects, spiders, and conifer seeds. Since chickadees do not migrate south for the winter, they store food for use during the cold months. Their stockpiles exist in various places, such as wedged into pine needle clusters or tree bark or even pounded into the ground. In addition, they store food in the lower branches of conifer trees, so it will be available when the upper branches are covered with snow.

Storing food for later use requires remembering where it is, and studies have shown that chickadees can remember where they stored items for months. The hippocampus is the area of the brain involved in memory and spatial learning. When food storage moves into high gear in the fall, the chickadee brain grows new neurons in the hippocampus. Their brain stores visual cues such as the spatial relationship between significant landmarks, allowing them to remember their cache locations from fall until the following spring. The complexity of chickadees is extraordinary. They are another example of God's design in the natural world, enabling the survival of a small creature we take for granted.

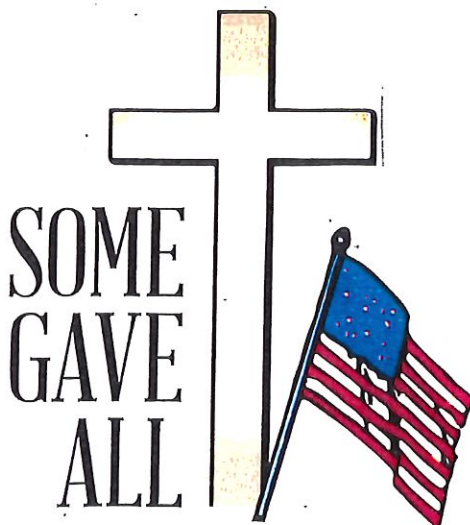

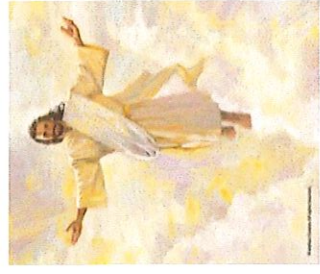
