Your child brought home their B door page today. The directions for what to do are on the door. This is not required but it is a fun way to practice letter recognition and beginning sounds. We are practicing our numbers O-11. We have added rhombus, octagon, hexagon, and trapezoid to the shapes we are learning. In language we are continuing to work on letter sounds and recognizing the beginning and ending sounds in words.

This week, during Jesus' time, we learned the story of God giving His people directions to build the Tabernacle so that He could dwell among them while they were traveling. We also learned about the Israelites sending spies into the land God promised them before they entered. These stories remind us that God is always with us; will always take care of us and wants what is best for us. We worked on writing the letter J this week. I have included some handwriting practice for the capital and lowercase H if you would like to work on that at home with your child.

Thank you for taking time out of your busy schedules to attend parent/teacher conferences.

In Jesus time, we talked about Moses and the Twelve Spies. Moses sent twelve spies to look at the land God promised to give His people. Ten spies were scared, but two- Joshua and Calebtrusted God and said, "God will help us- let's trust Him!"

In Superkids, we met our sixth Superkid friend Sal, and we are working on the letter S and increasing the number of words that we can sound out and blend together.

We have completed 40 math lessons so far and have completed 3 assessments. In Social Studies, this week we talked about where we live and that we live in a city, in a state, in a country.

We brought home our November snack calendar this week. Our new snack prayer for November is to the tune of "Mary had a Little Lamb" and the words are "God, we thank you for this food, for this food, we praise your name. Amen."

We are learning about Martin Luther on our flannel graph. He was born in Germany to Hans and Margaret Luther. He was baptized when he was one day old. Martin went to grade school and when he was high school age he lived at the school. He would go home to visit, and one time on his way back to school, he got caught in a storm, he hid under a tree and lightning struck nearby, Martin asked St. Anne to help him, and he would become a monk. A monk is someone who leaves his family, to become a priest or pastor. He told his friends at college and before he left, they gave him his first Bible. He became a priest (pastor). During this time, a man named John Tetzel came to sell indulgences to raise money to build the church in Rome. Martin was against these indulgences, and posted the 95 theses on the church door on All Hallows Eve; we call this Halloween. Martin wanted everyone to know about the true God, pray only to Him, and know that Jesus died on the cross for the forgiveness of sins.

In math we have been learning vertical, horizontal, and oblique lines. Students continue to find important numbers in word problems, add doubles, create fact families, make fractions half, fourths, thirds, sixths, and eighths. We also graphed the kinds of apples we like the best. None of us chose Red Delicious; two chose green Granny Smith, and 9 chose Golden Ginger. In Superkids 2nd Grade began Goodbye Summer! Cute one-page stories to wrap up summer and begin 2nd Grade. The students have also been drawing pictures and writing stories to go along with them.

It's the end of October already! The first quarter is flying by! Thank you to all the parents who signed up for conferences this week.

Our next special event to mark on your calendars will be the Christmas parade in November. Please consider helping build the float or walk along with us this year!

We have been adding new concepts in Math. It's getting harder each week. Please consider having your child bring home the Math assignment each day for you to look over. We do correct the previous day's assignment each day and qo over any mistakes that have been made. I don't want anyone to keep making the same mistake over and over!

We continue to learn the commandments and their meaning in Memory.

We took Week 7 Spelling Test today. Have a great three day weekend. Another week complete! Today marks the end of the first quarter for this school year already. Students will have report cards sent home with them next week. We will keep moving right along in our learning as we start the second quarter.

We will be doing lessons 33-37 in math next week. We are starting our next unit in religion and will be discussing Moses in the coming lessons.

We will be learning about compound subjects and predicates next week in grammar, and sharing our first story of the year in writing. We will be having a test on our vocabulary words next week Friday too.

Thank you to everyone for signing up and coming in for conferences, and enjoy your extra long weekend! One more week in the books. I am happy to have seen so many parents at conferences. Many things were discussed for the betterment of the students. If you were unable to make it to conferences, please feel free to contact me to set up a time for a meeting.

We are now discussing the American Revolution in History. We will talk about the basics of it and why it was necessary. Depending upon how long we will study this era, we will probably incorporate Colonial Christmas traditions as a proiect. I will have more details as the time gets closer. In Science, we are still discussing the Superstorm of 1993 and weather systems related to that subject. In Language Arts, we are starting to talk about subjects and predicates. It will become more refined as we take a closer look at nouns and verbs. At this point in the year, the students should have twenty or more cards for their Language Arts ring and thirty or more for their Math ring. In Literature, we are reading Rip Van Winkle, which is at the end of the Sleepy Hollow book. Our next novel is A Christmas Carol. In Confirmation, they are continuing to learn about the Ten Commandments with Pastor Schrader.

We will be starting winter sports and Christmas program practices soon. As those dates get closer, we will have more information.

Keep checking in with your students. They should be bringing home corrected homework and a filled-out assignment book nightly. If they are not, please talk to them.

Healthy, Gluten-Free Cheesy Crackers





Part of the beauty of gluten-free dough is that you don't have to worry about handling it too much, so kids can really go to town rolling and shaping these snack-friendly cheesy crackers. (Overworking dough with gluten in the flour can make the dough tough.) For little and big kids: Let them measure ingredients, cut out the crackers and sprinkle on the toppings. For big kids: Let them try rolling out the dough.

Level: Easy

Total: 2 hr 40 min (includes chilling and cooling times)

Active: 1 hr

Yield: about 100 crackers

Ingredients:

- 1 large egg, separated
- 1 tablespoon cider vinegar
- 1 1/2 cups gluten-free all-purpose flour, plus more for dusting
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 3/4 teaspoon kosher salt, plus more for sprinkling
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon turmeric
- 6 tablespoons unsalted butter, cut into small pieces
- 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan
- 1 tablespoon white sesame seeds
- 2 teaspoons poppy seeds

Directions:

Special equipment: Your favorite 1 1/2-inch cookie cutters



- 1 Whisk together the egg white, vinegar and 3 tablespoons water in a small bowl; set aside. Refrigerate the egg yolk in a small bowl, covered, until ready to use.
- 2 Pulse the flour, cornstarch, salt, baking powder, mustard, paprika and turmeric in a food processor to combine. Add the butter, Cheddar and Parmesan, and pulse until the butter is completely broken up. Pour in the egg white mixture, and pulse until the dough comes together in a ball. (It's OK if it's a little wet.)
- 3 Transfer the dough to a large piece of plastic wrap, and pat it into a 1/2-inch-thick round. Wrap it up, and refrigerate to chill and firm up the dough, about 1 hour.
- 4 Position 2 oven racks at the top and bottom third of the oven, and preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment.
- 5 Roll the dough out on a large piece of parchment (to keep it from sticking to the counter) to about 1/8 inch thick. Cut shapes out with a 1 1/2-inch cookie cutter, and transfer the cutouts to the prepared baking sheets, spacing them about 1/2 inch apart. Gather and reroll the scraps and cut out more crackers; repeat with any remaining scraps. (Dust the dough with flour if you find it too sticky.)
- 6 Whisk 2 teaspoons water into the egg yolk. Brush the tops of each cracker with the mixture. Sprinkle each with some sesame seeds, poppy seeds and the tiniest pinch of salt.
- 7 Bake 2 baking sheets of crackers at a time, until the crackers are deep golden brown on the bottom, about 20 minutes, rotating the sheets about halfway through. Let cool on the baking sheet for a few minutes, then transfer to a cooling rack to cool completely. Bake the remaining cutouts.
- 8 Store the crackers at room temperature in an airtight container for up to 2 days, or freeze them for up to 1 week.
